

Halt to Nuclear Testing Rejected by Soviet Union

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—The Soviet Union rejected yesterday the proposal of the United States and Britain to suspend nuclear weapons tests for one year beginning Friday.

That is the day the three powers are to open negotiations in Geneva on an agreement to suspend tests under a control

Chinese Reds Go 'Halfway' In Cease-Fire

TAIPEI, Formosa (AP)—The Chinese Reds scattered light shell-fire around the Quemoy Islands yesterday, then moved into another no-shooting phase of their halfway cease-fire in Formosa Strait.

The Nationalists announced that in the six-day period before the start of the new Red cease-fire Sunday, Communist shells had killed 19 off-shore island civilians, wounded 11 others, and destroyed 233 homes.

Under the rules of their cease-fire, the Reds shoot anywhere on odd-numbered days. But on even-numbered days they do not fire at Quemoy areas where supplies are landed.

Sunday was the first even-numbered day, and none of the light Communist barrages hit supply landing areas. Monday, an odd-numbered day of the month, was open season, but the firing was light any way.

Cardinals Deadlock In Papal Balloting

VATICAN CITY (AP)—The Princes of the Roman Catholic Church were deadlocked yesterday in their efforts to elect a successor to Pope Pius XII.

Two full days of balloting in the deep secrecy of the Sistine Chapel had failed to resolve the issue. The 51 cardinals participating presumably had completed eight ballots.

Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Valerian A. Zorin announced the rejection of the U.S.-British proposal in the 81-nation U.N. Political Committee.

The Soviet Union chose that place to reply to the challenge issued Saturday by President Eisenhower. He called for Moscow to join with the United States and Britain in a one-year unconditional suspension of all atomic-hydrogen tests.

Zorin declared a cessation of tests should not be made dependent on whether agreement is reached in Geneva. He added that the Soviet Union was prepared "to contribute in every possible way" to the success of the negotiations.

Zorin reiterated that the Soviet Union intends to keep on with nuclear weapons tests until their number equals the total of the United States and Britain since last March 31—the day the Soviet Union announced a unilateral decision to suspend tests.

Moscow resumed tests Sept. 30. Zorin said the Soviet Union insists upon an unconditional agreement to suspend tests immediately and forever.

Swedes Boycott Lenin Award

STOCKHOLM, Sweden (AP)—Three noted Swedish literary men announced their boycott of the presentation of a Lenin Prize to a Swedish author last night.

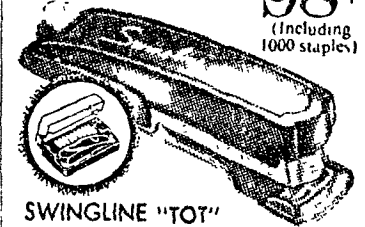
The boycott came on the heels of a Soviet outburst at the Nobel Prize Committee's decision to

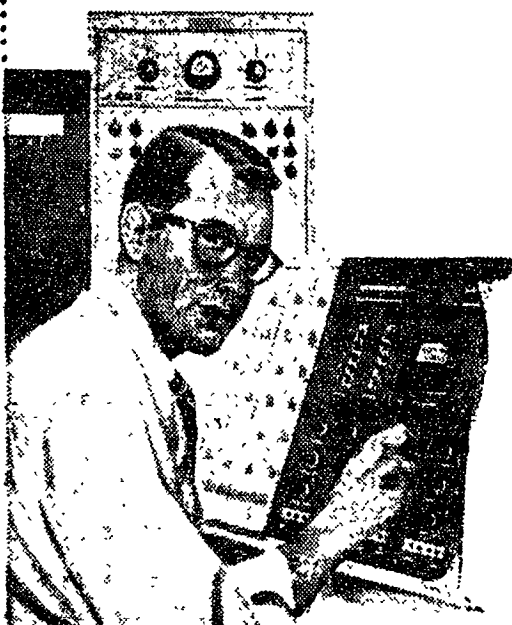
Mindszenty Refused Papal Election Journey
