



# AIM Plans Handbook Evaluation

The Association of Independent Men Board of Governors will poll students on the value of the AIM handbook.

It was questioned at a board meeting Wednesday night whether or not the handbook is worth the \$528 necessary for its publication.

Amid discussion on the question of including the AIM constitution in the handbook, Donald Dennis, treasurer of AIM, said: "As treasurer of AIM and as business manager of the handbook, I feel that the money appropriated for this handbook's publication is the biggest waste of money that we have on our budget."

Dennis supported his statement by reminding the board that it had already observed the fact that the majority of the handbooks issued during Orientation Week were discarded after cursory readings.

He recommended that the board draw up a survey to be circulated among the students in the form of a questionnaire so that concrete evidence may be derived on the question before further action.

Dennis suggested that should the board find the handbook ineffective, action should be taken to edit an eight page pamphlet containing the pertinent information of AIM.

Dennis gained approval from the board on his poll suggestion and it was adopted.

It was previously observed that the constitution took up about one-sixth of the handbook.

# IGY Scientists Arrive Today

Four of the world's top scientists will arrive on the campus today in preparation for the meeting of the Executive Board of the International Geophysical Year.

Dr. Marcel Nicolet, secretary-general of the Special Committee of the IGY and consultant to the Ionosphere Research

Laboratory at the University, said the scientists will begin their meetings tomorrow morning.

The five scientists will participate in a television program entitled "The Greatest Enterprise on Earth," at 4 p.m. Sunday on WFBG-TV, Channel 10, Altoona. President Eric A. Walker will moderate the panel discussion.

Nicolet said the scientists would meet all day tomorrow, Sunday and Monday in the conference room of the Electrical Engineering Building to review the aspects of the entire IGY administration and program.

The scientists will prepare the program and the topics they wish to consider at tomorrow morning's meeting. Twenty meetings of the Special Committee have been held since 1953, Nicolet said, and this will be the third meeting this year.

The scientists, representing Belgium, Russia, England, France and the United States, will discuss items concerning the extension of international cooperation in geophysics, study experiences and results obtained during the IGY, Nicolet said.

Besides Nicolet, who heads the Department of Radiation at Belgium's Royal Meteorological Institute, other members of the

committee attending will be professor Vladimir V. Belousov, vice president of the USSR IGY committee and director of the Institute of Geophysics in Moscow.

Sydney Chapman, retired professor at England's Oxford University, member of the Royal Society of London, and president of the Special Committee of the IGY; professor Jean Coulomb, director of the National Center for Scientific Research in France and of the Institute of Geophysics at Paris University; and Dr. Homer E. Newell, Jr., of the Naval Research Laboratory and the National Aeronautics Space Agency.

The special committee, consisting of delegates of the International Scientific Unions and 68 participating IGY committees, held its last meeting in August in Moscow.
