

Soccermen Seek 4th Win Delts Upset Alpha Sig, 13-7; Against Navy Tomorrow Inebriates Take League B Title

It's "Anchors Away" for the Penn State soccer team as they prepare to set sail for Annapolis and a Saturday morning tilt with Glenn Warner's Midshipmen.

The Lions will be looking for their fourth win in six outings. They have lost to West Chester and Maryland and have beaten Syracuse, Colgate and Bucknell.

Lion coach Kenny Hosterman regards this as a "must" game for the Lions.

"We have had a lot of winning soccer teams in the school's history. It would be a shame to see a team with this potential lie down and quit just because they lost two games. The boys on the team not only have the school's name to uphold but their own. I hope they really think about that," he said.

Hosterman will send another "revamped" forward line into tomorrow's game. The change sees Harry Lambroussis move to center forward in place of Loren Kline. Kline is moving back to his original wing position.

Lambroussis was slated to be the Lion starting center forward before the season began, but a broken nose in a practice game sidelined him until last week. Against Maryland a week ago Lambroussis tallied the only goal.

Flanking Lambroussis will be the Lion's two high scorers—Mike Stollmeyer and Billy Fiedler. The two have scored more than half the team's goals. Fiedler has six and Stollmeyer three.

Fiedler started the season with a bang by scoring four goals against Bucknell. His opening game performance plus his reputation—last year he scored 20 goals—is causing opposing teams to watch him extra closely this year.

Pete Wadsworth and Kline are slated to open at the wing slots. This marks the third different position Kline has played in three games.

Captain Herby Hertner will head the Lion halfback brigade. He will be at right half, Billy Rieron at center half and Gary Miller will be at left half.

The Lion defense remains the same with Wayne Rodgers and Paul Bauer at fullback and the always dependable Jerry Bruce at the goal.

In two of the hottest-contested games of the intramural football season Delta Tau Delta upset previously undefeated and unscored-on Alpha Sigma Phi, 13-7, to produce a tie in League F fraternity competition and the Inebriates edged the Sixty Niners, 3-2, to remain undefeated and clinch the League B championship.

In other games last night shut-outs were the rule as the Goopers walloped Nittany Co-op, 32-0. Alpha Phi Delta defeated Zeta Beta Tau, 14-0, Alpha Tau Omega edged Pi Lambda Phi, 6-0; Beta Theta Pi was victorious over Phi Kappa Psi, 7-0; Phi Mu Delta proved too much for Lambda Chi Alpha, 13-0; Phi Gamma Delta outscored Theta Xi, 14-7; and Pi Sigma Upsilon and Tau Phi Delta tied, 7-7, but Pi Sigma won on the basis of first downs, getting 3 to Tau Phi Delta's 2.

7-0 lead into the last quarter against Delta Tau Delta. But a 10-yard pass from Sam Bowman to Bob Pulver and a 40-yard pass from Bowman to Dave Dunn pulled the game out of the fire for Delta Tau Delta. Alpha Sigma Phi was held scoreless after the first quarter when a kickoff pass from Dick Hinkle to Jim Norton to Andy Griffith resulted in a touchdown.

Walt Schenck engineered the Goopers to its 32-0 conquest of Nittany Co-op by scoring once himself on a 10-yard run and passing for three other TD's. Schenck hit Larry Sikes with a 30-yarder, Jerry Dost with a 5-yarder and Cliff Wright with a 25-yarder. Chuck Parry raced 55 yards with an interception for the other TD.

The Inebriates staged off a last-ditch rally by the Sixty Niners to win, 3-0, by way of Bob Knepp's 22-yard field goal with 8 seconds left in the first half. The Sixty Niners had a first and goal on the 1-inch line but couldn't score.

Fred Smiyzer snagged two long passes from Jack Feola to score twice for Alpha Phi Delta and led them to a 14-0 triumph over Zeta Beta Tau. The PAT's were kicked by Joe Santoro.

6-0 triumph over Pi Lambda Phi when Dick Bohner made a leaping catch of a 15-yard pass from Mel Royer.

With one minute left to play in the game, Tau Phi Delta and Pi Sigma Upsilon were deadlocked, 7-7, and both teams also had two first downs. With four seconds to go, Ed Datasch snagged an aerial from Ray Tuleya to record a first down and give PSU the victory.

Bob Luft pulled down 50- and 60-yard passes from Ron Blend and scored both of Phi Mu Delta's TD's, as they shutout Lambda Chi Alpha, 13-0.

A 15-yard pass from John Swain to Al Clemmons proved the margin of victory as Beta Theta Pi decisioned Phi Kappa Psi, 7-0.

The clutch playing of Wayne Breisch led Phi Gamma Delta to a 14-7 win over Theta Xi. With the score tied at 7-7 and four minutes left to go in the game, Breisch intercepted a pass at midfield. In the ensuing drive by Phi Gam, he caught three passes from Lou Tronza, the final one a 16-yarder for the winning TD. Earlier, Bill Harmon blocked a pass and plucked it out of the air, returning it 65 yards for a TD. Bob Carol scored for Theta Xi on a 40-yard aerial from Dick Barth.
