Dulles Blasts Russia For Nuclear Tests

WASHINGTON (A)—Secretary of State John Foster Dulles said yesterday the world will condemn Russia for continuing nuclear weapons tests in the face of a United Nations resolution urging a halt.

Dulles made this comment to a news conference a few

hours after the United States and Britain disclosed they caught on a statement by President Ei-Russia firing what might have

been two sneak shots.
