Many details must also be worked out by Cabinet commit-tees, Byers said.

The party does not have the facilities to examine all the issues in detail, Byers said. However, he said the candidates do have specific ideas on the planks.

Byers also said there was a lack of space to include all de-

Byers said there is a definite need for free legal advice for students, because of the number of students who come to the faculty and administration for that advice.

About 10 students a day ask legal advice of some member of the faculty or administration, according to Byers. He said this advice cannot be given by the dean of men or dean of women's of-

The Collegian editorial stated it


