

# U.S. Warns Soviets To Stop Air Attacks

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States has warned the Soviet Union to quit harrasing American planes in international airspace or face the consequences.

What might happen was not spelled out.

A stern U.S. note, delivered to the Kremlin Nov. 13 and made public yesterday, cited two incidents occurring on Nov. 7:

● A U.S. plane flying over the Baltic Sea, about 66 miles from the nearest Soviet territory, was fired on twice without warning by Soviet fighter planes.

● A few hours later, another U.S. plane was intercepted three times by Soviet fighters in the Sea of Japan 64 miles from the Siberian coast and about 300 miles north of Vladivostok. No shots were fired but the Soviets "made simulated attacks."

The U.S. protest said in neither case did the American aircraft open fire.

"If such dangerous tactics are in the future repeated by Soviet aircraft in close proximity to American aircraft in international airspace, the Soviet government should be aware that commanders of American aircraft will be under instructions to take any defensive action which they consider necessary and appropriate," it added.

# Pope Selects Two Americans For College

VATICAN CITY (AP)—The archbishops of Boston and Philadelphia were chosen yesterday to be cardinals, along with 21 prelates of other nationalities.

The 23 new cardinals will bring the College of Cardinals to 75, largest membership in Roman Catholic history.

Pope John XXIII called a consistory for Dec. 15 to 18 to give the new cardinals their red hats.

The new American cardinals are the Most Rev. Richard J. Cushing, 63, archbishop of Boston since 1944; and Most Rev. John F. O'ara, 70, archbishop of Philadelphia since 1951. They will join Cardinals Spellman of New York and McIntyre of Los Angeles in bringing the U.S. representation to four, one less than the 1946 peak.

# Tornadoes, Snows Cripple Mid-West American Convoy Tests Red Tactics

KANSAS CITY (AP) — A record-making storm slugged the mid-continent region from Mexico to the Canadian border yesterday with tornadoes, heavy snows and flood-making rains.

With winter officially more than a month away, the Weather Bureau said the big blow "will make weather history."

Two persons were known dead, more than a dozen injured, at least 27 missing and 50 more were snowbound at Mt. Lemmon lodge in the Santa Catalina Mountains of Arizona.

BERLIN (AP)—A U.S. Army truck convoy rolled without incident yesterday from Allied-occupied West Berlin to West Germany, easing blocking fears.

It was the first convoy to make the 110-mile trip from Berlin through East Germany since the Soviets turned back an American military convoy Friday.

Monday's convoy of a jeep and two open trucks was regarded as a test of Soviet-East German tactics.


