

Funeral Services Held for Dr. Wilson

Funeral services were held yesterday for Dr. Harold K. Wilson, associate dean of admissions for research and development and former head of the Division of Intermediate Registration.

Wilson, who was 58, died Wednesday in his home at 256 E. Irvin Ave. He had been in ill health for some time and was seriously ill for about 10 days before his death.

A member of the faculty and administration for 13 years, Wilson was head of DIR until it became a part of the Division of Counseling.

In addition to the DIR position, he was dean of men from 1949 to 1952.

Recognizing a need for proper guidance, he established the residence hall counseling program.

When named to the faculty in 1945, Wilson served as professor and head of the Department of Agronomy. He was promoted to the position of vice dean and director of resident instruction in the College of Agriculture in 1946.

Wilson resigned as dean of men in 1952 to devote full time to DIR administration. He continued as professor of agronomy until his death.

Wilson was a graduate of Iowa State College and held master of science and doctor of philosophy degrees at the University of Illinois.

Main Campus Enrollment Led By Allegheny

Allegheny County once again leads the state with the largest number of undergraduate students enrolled on the main campus.

The county has contributed roughly 10 per cent of the undergraduate total, or 1230 students, in the enrollment for the 1958-59 school year.

Represented in the 14,634 total enrollment are all counties of the commonwealth, 37 of the 49 states, and 17 foreign countries.
