

Lucido Outslugs Vega In Top IM Boxing Bout

Fast-paced and free-swinging bouts were the feature of the evening in the intramural boxing tournament in Rec Hall last night.

Pugilists from Phi Kappa Psi and Delta Upsilon demonstrated their prowess as each house captured two bouts.

The last fight was the greatest crowd pleaser as Armando Vega, Beta Theta Pi, and Chet Lucido, Phi Kappa Psi, hooked up in a free-swinging affair in the 135-pound division. The roar of the crowd never died till the final bell as both contestants banged away incessantly.

Vega bulled his way in, while Lucido backpeddled and scored sharply with good combinations. Vega was leading with his right and Lucido outboxed the bigger man with flurries of punches to the head to gain the unanimous decision.

Cy Dubinsky, Delta Upsilon, relied on the effectiveness of his left jab to defeat Tony Perrotta, Phi Kappa, in a 165-pound contest. Dubinsky's style was smooth and his harassing jab constantly made a target of Perrotta's nose in one of the more stylish fights on the card.

Richard Hammond scored the other win for DU, by outpointing Milton McGriff, Omega Psi Phi, in the opening bout. The fight was slow for two rounds but erupted into a slam-bang affair in the final stanza with Hammond gaining a narrow margin of victory.

Cool and collected Richard Palaschak, Theta Kappa Phi, gained a majority vote over Duane Thomas, Beaver House, in an evenly matched 145-pound contest.

Richard Hinkel, Alpha Sigma Phi, scored a 155-pound decision over Alpha Gamma Rho's John Boyer in what referee Eddie Sulkowski termed the "best bout of the evening." Sulkowski said Hinkel, who won the 145-pound championship last year, was the most polished boxer. "He had a good left cross and right," said the former Lion boxing mentor.

There was lots of leather flying in the second bout when 165-pound Dan Gifford of Beta Theta Pi unleashed a wild two-fisted attack to decision Bob Myers of Phi Epsilon Pi.

Tau Phi Delta's Joel Hockinson used his longer reach to an advantage in a fast-paced encounter with Ben Meledandri, Theta Xi, in the 135-pound class. Hockinson aimed his attack at his opponent's head and landed some good series of lefts and rights to Meledandri's face.

Tom Gross, Sigma Nu, grabbed a decision in the 155-pound division over Louis Silverhart, Phi Sigma Delta. Silverhart tried to force the fighting in close but Gross counterpunched effectively, and built up an advantage in the last two rounds. Silverhart came

back strong in the finale and made it a fighting finish.

Gene Flick, Tau Kappa Epsilon, was awarded a victory over Louis Papp, Chi Phi, in a 175-pound fight that was stopped in the first round.
