

IFC to Hold Pledge Date Discussion

The Interfraternity Council will open discussion Monday night on the establishment of a formal pledging date for the spring semester.

The council, which will hold a dinner meeting at 5:45 p.m. Monday at Alpha Gamma Rho, will also discuss proposals to have the University withhold diplomas to fraternity members who have debts to the fraternity.

Under the present deferred rushing system, the pledging date may be set any time between the 7th and 10th weeks of the spring semester. Freshmen will begin rushing the first day of the spring semester.

James Hammerele, administrative vice president, said the IFC executive committee will probably consider the establishment of a pledging date at its meeting Monday afternoon.

He also said the discussion on recommending to the University the withholding of diplomas and class grades of fraternity members who have accounts receivable with their chapters will be in its first stages.

The group is expected to make no concrete recommendation Monday but merely see how prevalent the problem is among the fraternities and whether the University is willing to cooperate with the fraternities.

Edward Hintz, IFC president, will report on the National Interfraternity Conference meeting being held in Atlanta, Ga. this weekend.

With the score tied 7-7 at the half, the Orioles snagged 20 counters to Nittany 28's 7 to take a 27-14 victory in league F. Ron Moncrief swished the nets for five counters to take scoring laurels for the Orioles.

The Imperials maintained their league G tie with the Motogimps by edging the previously undefeated Prestoes 28-20. Bill Hastings racked up 9 points for the Imperials.

The Bird Dogs handed Nittany 23 its third straight defeat in a 29-17 romp. This victory put the Bird Dogs in a two-way tie with Nittany 34 for league F leadership as both teams are boasting 3-0 records.

Nittany 26 scored its second straight victory in league E, downing the Potrzebies, 23-13. Bill Hillwig's 11 points for Nittany 26 won him scoring honors.

Other games showed Tony's Terrors downing the Knights, 27-14 and Paradise 39, edged the Nittany Trojans, 27-24.

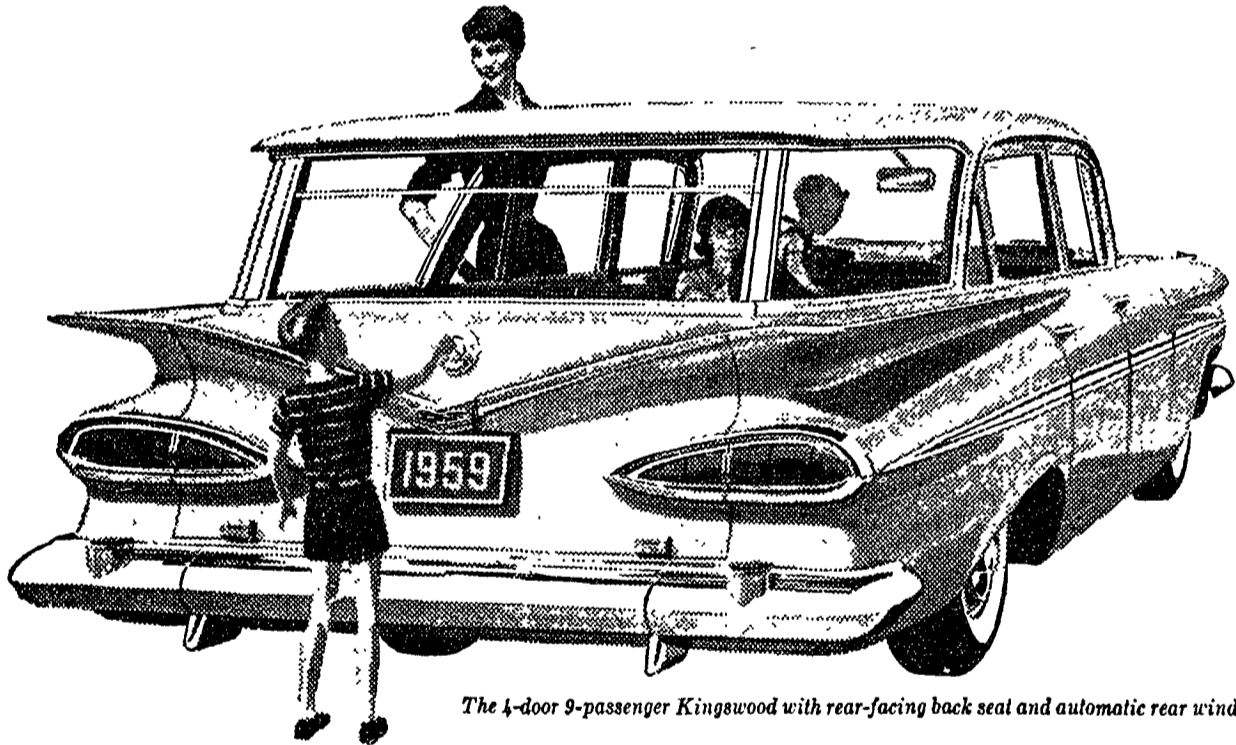
