

May Day Evaluation Planned by WSGA

The Women's Student Government Association has sent 200 questionnaires on the value of May Day to parents and relatives of students who have seen past programs.

The survey is an attempt to find out what people off campus think of the program and in what ways it can be improved this year. Should the response be negative to the May Day program, WSGA will also determine whether or not it will be eliminated.

Class Crest Competition Opens Today

The Junior Class Advisory Board today will begin a contest to design a junior class emblem.

A \$10 prize will be awarded to the junior who submits the best design. The name of the winner will be published in The Daily Collegian.

Contest rules are:

- Only juniors may enter
- Entries must be submitted by mail to Vincent Marino, Theta Delta Chi, 305 East Prospect Avenue, State College, by January 14
- Designs must be done on paper of regular typing size and capable of being manufactured in approximately 3 1/2" circular size (similar to the standard University emblem).
- Designs must contain the words "Pennsylvania State University" (or "Penn State") and "Class of 1960"

Semi-final selections will be made by a committee of the Advisory Board and final selection of the winning entry will be made by members of the art department. Honorable mention will be given to the contestants who submit the four best designs considered by the judges of the art department in addition to the winning entry.

The Advisory Board plans to have the winning design manufactured into an emblem which will be sold to members of the junior class. The emblem may be worn on blazers and jackets.

Designs submitted should be of the same general type as the present University emblem but participants are urged to use as much originality as possible in designing the new emblem. The designs do not necessarily have to be circular in shape but the final dimensions of the emblem cannot be more than 3 1/2" in size. Juniors are reminded that the winning design will be manufactured in the University colors of blue and white.

Whether or not May Day serves a purpose and fulfills it is questioned. The suitability of a permanent indoor program is also questioned in the evaluation.

Other things specified in the questionnaire are attendance at residence halls teas; whether teas should be held Saturday or Sunday, and if meeting the May Queen and her court would please parents and visitors.

In addition, the merits of the weekend as a whole are questioned and suggestions for improving the May Day program or Mother's Weekend are requested.

Only a limited number of replies have been received by Jessie Janjigian, chairman. However, Miss Janjigian said she hopes to have the information for a final report before the end of the semester.

Participants selected for this evaluation were received through residence hall presidents who asked students to submit names of their parents who had seen the program in past years.

Bell Scholarship Planned

Bell was graduated from the University in 1929 and was a former editor of The Daily Collegian.

He had been cited by the American College Public Relations Association for achievement.
