Khrushchev Says Reds Lead in Ag

LONDON (AP)—Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev claimed yesterday the Soviet Union is outstripping the United States in total wool, butter, milk, and cotton production. But he acknowledged major shortcomings in Soviet agriculture.

He blamed the fall-down on five ex-leaders fired out of government and party posts on charges that they are enemies of the Soviet Communist party.

Last week Gen. Ivan Serov, Soviet security chief and for a long time Khrushchev's personal body-guard, was removed from his post.

State Agents Will Hit Cigarette Bootlegging

HARRISBURG (AP)—The State Revenue Department opened a special drive yesterday aimed at bootlegging of untaxed cigarettes into Pennsylvania during the holiday period.

Enforcement agents were authorized to set up roadblocks at border points for inspection of automobiles in a move to discharge traffic in untaxed cigarettes.

1 Dies in Venezuela Riot

CACAS, Venezuela (AP) — One man was reported killed and 27 wounded Sunday night in rioting at El Consejo, 30 miles southwest of Caracas.

Dispatches from the village said 17 persons were arrested in a fight set off when 500 persons attacked the police station with gunfire and home made bombs.

McBride Resigns Position

HARRISBURG (AP)—Thomas D. McBride submitted his resignation as attorney general yesterday.

GOP Join Forces To Control Senate

WASHINGTON (AP) — Ten strong supporters of the Eisenhower foreign policy banded together yesterday for a fight to win control of the Republican leadership in the Senate.

The 10 senators voted unanimously to offer a full slate of candidates to the Republican caucus which meets in January to elect officers for the new Senate.

This was a challenge to Sen. Styles Bridges of New Hampshire, chairman of the Senate GOP Policy Committee, and to Sen. Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois, Bridges' choice to succeed retiring Sen. William F. Knowland of California as Republican floor leader.

It could lead to a decision by Bridges, the senior Senate Republican, to ask for the floor leadership himself.

23 New Princes Added To College of Cardinals

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope John XXIII reinforced the College of Cardinals yesterday with 23 new princes to help him bear the growing burdens of the Roman Catholic Church.

Archbishops Richard James Cushing of Boston and John F. O'Hara of Philadelphia were formally elevated to the purple along with 21 other prelates from eight nations at a secret consistory.

Van Brocklin to Stay

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Norm Van Brocklin will continue to play for the Eagles and during the off season will work in a public relations capacity.

The star passer, who Sunday completed his first season with the Eagles, will make speeches and help promote interest in the club.

Dulles, deGaulle Fail to Arrive At Agreement

PARIS (AP) — U.S. Secretary of State John Foster Dulles and French Premier Charles de Gaulle failed yesterday to sweep away underlying differences between France and the United States on the eve of important Atlantic Pact conferences.

On Berlin, both reaffirmed the Western position taken Sunday that Britain, France and the United States would maintain their position and keep free access to the city despite threatening moves from Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev.

Dulles and the foreign ministers of all the North Atlantic Treaty Organization countries sit down today to consider the Berlin question and a wide range of defense problems.

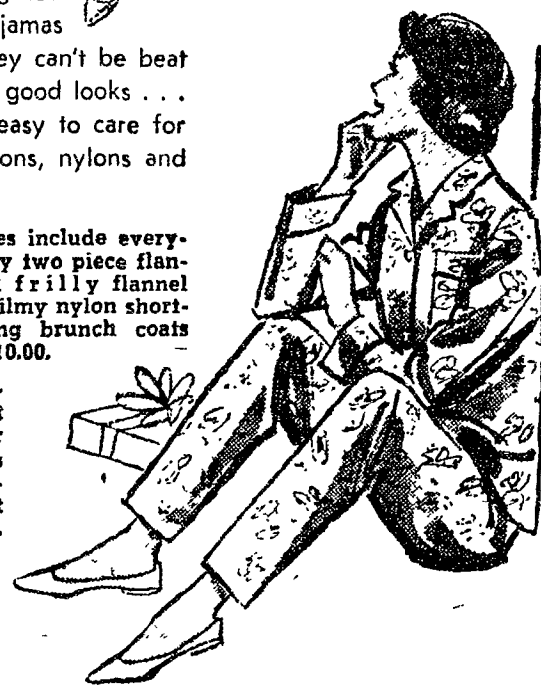
