date degree students and 3 1/2 years including trigonometry for regular students.

Most of the courses these students take are especially designed for them. They are given at a slightly different mathematical level—leaning a little more toward applied mathematics and a little less toward theory than straight engineering courses.

Approximately 1100 students have been graduated in the four classes since the program was be-

gun. Their current average starting salaries range from \$360 to \$400 a month. There are currently 14 centers offering a two-year course in the associate engineering program. They have 1635 students in the four curriculums offered towards the degree. These curriculums are drafting and design technology; electrical technology; production technology, and surveying technology. This year a graduating class of 400—the largest to date—is expected.

As to the future of the program, Holderman said, "This is the area of education which will have to be expanded more than any other because so many students will want education of this type and

so many industries need graduates with these qualifications. Probably more thought is given to this than most other University problems. Penn State will have to expand its program."
