

Construction Continues Despite Cold

Construction on campus is continuing despite the cold weather, according to Director of the Physical Plant Walter H. Wiegand.

"The cold wave has slowed down construction operations," Wiegand said, "but we are still doing what we can."

The colder temperatures have made it necessary to cover forms into which cement is poured, a workman on one of the construction projects explained.

He said that after the cement has been poured, it must be kept heated for 72 hours. A kerosene heater called a Salamander is used to heat the cement.

Calcium chloride is also used to keep cement from freezing, a General State Authority inspector said. He said that not over two per cent calcium chloride may be mixed in the cement.

A supervisor on the home economics construction project said that bricklaying has begun on one of the new home economics buildings.

The bricklaying had been held up nearly two months while waiting for the General State Authority to approve sand that was to be used in the cement. Brick walls must also be covered and heated for 72 hours, he said.

In states which have similar social conditions the homicide rate is about the same in states without the death penalty as in those with it. And murders have not increased in the foreign countries which have abolished the death penalty.

It is an undisputed fact that our courts are occasionally in error. And this is a most powerful reason for ending death sentences. No one knows how many innocent men have heard juries return the verdict of "guilty of murder in the first degree."

Sometimes the wrong is brought to light and the man's name is cleared. But if he already has been put to death, it's just a little late for the court to erase its mistake.

As long as the death penalty exists, innocent men as well as the guilty and insane will continue to be murdered by the courts.
