

# Special Insurance Plan To Be Offered for Spring

Students who missed the student insurance program deadline in September may enroll in a special 7-month coverage plan at spring semester registration Jan. 28, 29, 30.

Russell Connelly, Cabinet insurance committee chairman, said that, beginning Thursday, information and enrollment forms will be available at the Hetzel Union desk and at the offices of Doty and Hench, 108 S. Allen St.

A Pittsburgh broker for the insurance firm and several students will be on hand at registration in Recreation Building to sign up students and also to answer any questions students might have.

Students enrolling in the special plan will be insured from February to September when registration for the regular plans will again be held.

Those who signed up for the program in September are insured until next semester and need not register again.

All three of the insurance plans will be offered at prorated prices for the special program. Rates will be \$10 for Plan I; \$3.25 for Plan II and \$8 for Plan III.

Ninety per cent of the students

enrolled in the insurance program are in Plan I which provides coverage up to \$7500. Plan II is designed for students already covered by a base family plan.

Plan III is similar to Plan I except that it does not provide for coverage after the maximum full compensation of the basic plan has been paid.

# Sigma Chi, Theta Xi, SPE Fined

Three fraternities were fined a total of \$130 by the Interfraternity Council Board of Control Sunday night for pledge registration violations.

Sigma Chi drew the heaviest fine—\$75 for failure to register 11 pledges with the IFC. Theta Xi was fined \$30 for two violations and Sigma Phi Epsilon \$25 for one violation.

The board fined six fraternities \$250 in December for pledge registration violations.

Three fraternities were found not guilty of violations in the hearings and three cases were postponed until the beginning of the spring semester at the fraternity's request.

Phi Epsilon Pi fraternity appealed the decision of the board rendered at its December hearing and was found not guilty of the charge. The fraternity had been fined \$25 for failure to register one pledge.

Under the present system, fraternities must register their pledges with the Fraternity Affairs Office within two weeks of their pledging. A fee of \$2 is charged for registering each pledge.

The difficulty in the present system, Board of Control Chairman Siders said, is that no actual receipt is given for each individual name registered. The only way the fraternities have of knowing who is registered is through check stubs and cancelled checks, he said.
