

Ike Calls For Lowering Of Farm Price Supports

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower asked Congress yesterday to plow under the present price support and production control programs of American agriculture.

He denounced these programs, in a special message, with an unusually severe bill of particulars.

Eisenhower proposed linking of price supports to market prices rather than the old concept of parity, which sought to guarantee the farmer something approaching fair prices in relation to farm costs.

He said nonsupported farm products are doing better than those given a crutch made of taxpayers' money.

Eisenhower's attack was in line with principles he and Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson have been plugging for years. The reaction in Congress was familiar, too, with much of it adverse.

There was general approval of one purpose Eisenhower restated: to explore all means for using America's great farm surpluses to help advance the cause of world peace.

This would presumably include the shipping of food to help feed the ill-nourished in lands which, because of their misery, could fall easy prey to the lures of communism.

Impossibility of New War Declared by Gromyko

MOSCOW (AP)—Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko declared yesterday the growing might of the Communist bloc, which he described as dedicated to peaceful coexistence, will soon make a new world war impossible.

He also told the 21st Soviet Communist party congress that arming of West Germany with atomic weapons was a roadway to war.

Integration to Begin Monday in Norfolk

NORFOLK, Va. (AP)—The Norfolk School Board yesterday ordered that six schools closed since September under Virginia's now-defunct anti-integration laws be opened Monday.

When the school bells ring Monday at 9 a. m. white and Negro children will enter public schools together for the first time in Virginia's history.

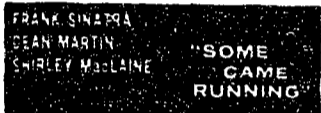
The schools were closed immediately under the state's massive resistance laws, which have since been invalidated by state and federal courts.
