

# Santoro Designs Portable Sets For Community Theatre Play

Floyd Santoro, senior in theater arts from Johnstown, has designed the sets for the Community Theatre production, "Alice in Wonderland," to be given at 7.30 p.m. tomorrow and at 10.30 a.m. and 2.30 p.m. Saturday in the State College Junior High School Auditorium.

The entire cast will be made up of children between the ages of 11 and 14, all from the State College area.

The play is a 3-act adaptation of Lewis Carroll's "Through the Looking Glass," and "The Adventures of Alice." The version which will be used was written by Charlotte Shorpenning.

Set designer Santoro says that he planned his designs to capture the "dream-like quality" of the illustrations from the original edition of Carroll's book which were drawn by Tenniel.

The sets will not be fixed sets, but will be movable ones which can be wheeled on and off the stage as they are needed.

A five-foot teapot is one of the unusual pieces which will appear

in the production. It will be used in the familiar scene of the Mad Hatter's Tea Party.

Since many of the characters

in the play are rather fantastic make-believe animals, masks will be used by the actors to portray them. The mechanical devices for these paper mache creations were devised by Mrs. Jon Barry Wilder.

The child actors were recruited from the State College junior high and elementary schools. The part of Alice will be played by Betsi Bell, daughter of Mrs. Louis H. Bell and the late Louis H. Bell, former director of the department of public information.

The price of the tickets is \$1 for adults and 35 cents for children. Tickets will be sold at the door for all performances.

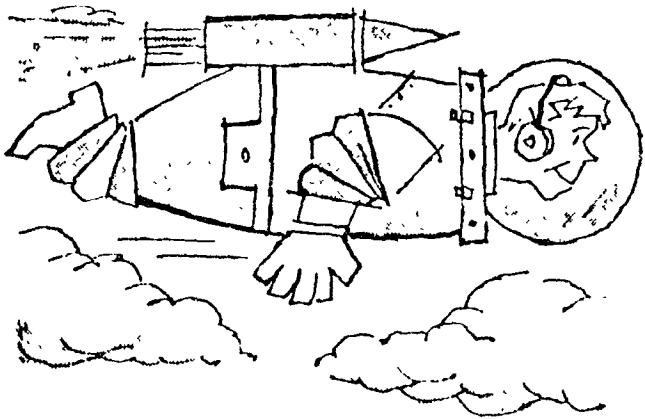

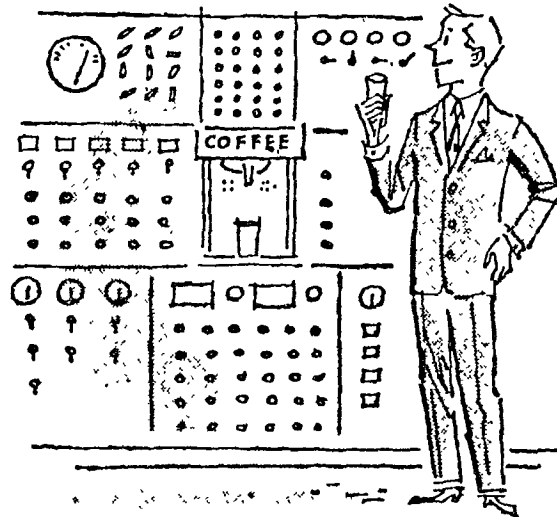
