

# New Emergency Plan Covers Campus Injuries

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A new University policy has officially extended ambulance and other Health Service emergency facilities to anyone injured on the campus.

A. E. Diem, vice president for business administration, said the policy replaces the former "feeling or general belief

that the ambulance was to be used only when a student needed emergency care."

Diem also cleared up the matter of procedure to be followed in emergencies or possible emergencies.

Citing the hypothetical case of a student, employee or visitor who is involved in a falling accident, Diem advised the following procedure:

• A doctor should be called to the scene and the patient should not be moved until the doctor has arrived to direct emergency operations.

• If in the doctor's judgment an ambulance were needed, the University vehicle would be summoned.

• The doctor would direct removal of the patient, and since the doctor is expected to be present in emergencies, the medical knowledge of the drivers is inconsequential.

Some controversy arose last semester over ambulance procedure when a witness to an accident complained of the slow response of the State College ambulance.

The new University policy will make it unnecessary to call the borough ambulance unless the Health Service vehicle is tied up elsewhere.

Diem also outlined an emergency program in the planning stages.

When in full swing, this program would mean that minor emergencies could be treated by trained personnel at different locations on campus. These personnel, in addition to being trained in first aid, Diem said, would also be trained to recognize when emergency medical attention was needed.

## Hillel to Offer Courses On Non-Credit Basis

# \$25, Plaque To Go To Best Essay

The second annual nationwide contest to stimulate the interest of college and university students in industrial and human relations will be co-sponsored by Industrial Relations News and the American Society for Personnel Administration.

This year's topic, "Should states have 'right-to-work' laws?" deals with laws, now in force in 19 states, which permit a ban on "closed-union" shops.

"Right-to-work" legislation was one of the major issues in the recent congressional elections and saw defeat of proposals in five out of six states. The issue will continue to be a prominent one through 1959, as labor seeks to extend its gains against this legislation.

The contest is open to full-time students taking personnel administration and/or industrial relations as a major or minor subject of study in an accredited American college or university. All entries for the contest must be in by midnight, April 30, 1959.

Entry blanks and contest rules may be obtained from Industrial Relations News, 230 West 41st St., New York 36, N.Y.; or American Society for Personnel Administration, Room 5 Kellogg Center, East Lansing, Michigan.

An award of a \$25 U.S. Savings Bond and a Plaque will be presented to the student writing the best essay. An Honor Certificate will be awarded to the second and third prize winners.

The awards will be announced at the Annual Conference of the American Society for Personnel Administration on June 17, 1959.

# Students May Aid Course Evaluation

Student opinion has been requested on the eight courses in the General Education program to aid in an evaluation of the courses by the University Senate Committee on Courses of Study.

The subjects to be evaluated will be arts 1 and 2, biological science 1 and 2, humanities 1 and 2 and social science 1 and 2.

Dr. Phillip A. Shelley, chairman of the course study committee, said yesterday:

"We definitely invite student comments on the courses. The committee has discussed ways of getting student reaction to them."

Under the terms approved by the Senate in June 1957, the eight courses were adopted for two years, subject to review by the courses of study committee this semester.

Shelley said his committee will first study a report covering some aspects of the General Education courses compiled by a subcommittee of the Senate Committee on Educational Policy.

Technical aspects of the courses will be considered, he said, together with the comment by students and faculty members.

"If anyone feels strongly enough about one or the other courses, we will invite him to come before the committee to discuss his views," Shelley said.

At its meeting Thursday, the Senate established a Committee on Faculty Affairs which will have the responsibility of advising the Senate on matters of policy concerning faculty matters.

The committee will be composed

of one member from each college and the Graduate School, with the majority, including the chairman, being from the elected membership of the Senate.

Senators expressed the opinions that this committee would be one means of increasing faculty morale and also would comply with President Eric A. Walker's recent request for more faculty responsibility.

# Senior Gets Office Pro For Incident

A University senior has been placed on office probation and prohibited from visiting any taproom in Centre County until the end of the semester by the Senate Subcommittee on Discipline.

Dan Rees, senior in business administration from Warrendale, heard the decision yesterday after the case was sent to the subcommittee by the dean of men's office.

Rees was found guilty of a disorderly conduct charge Tuesday and was fined \$35 and \$9 costs by Justice of the Peace William P. Bell.

State College police arrested Rees about 10:15 p.m. Monday after an incident on College Avenue.

The case was heard by Student Tribunal Tuesday and the group recommended to the dean of men's office that Rees be placed on office probation until the end of the semester, be prohibited from entering any establishment in Centre County which sells alcoholic beverages until March 8 and ordered Rees to make a formal apology to the person involved in the incident.

Rees apologized personally Thursday to the State College resident and this recommendation was dropped from the subcommittee action.

After testimony by Rees and members of the dean of men's staff, the subcommittee ordered Rees to refrain from visiting any taproom selling alcoholic beverages until the end of the semester. He will also remain on office probation and receive counseling from the dean of men's office.

## Professor to Lecture At Institute in Milan

Dr. Ralph F. Nielsen, professor of petroleum and natural gas engineering, is lecturing this month at the Technical School of the National Hydrocarbon Institute in Milan, Italy.

Nielsen has been granted a leave of absence for the period Feb. 1 to Aug. 1 and during this time will also tour Western Europe and deliver lectures at German, French and British petroleum institutes.
