May Day Program Modified

 "Modification will be the key-word of this year's May Day Program," according to Jessie Janjigian, chairman of the Women's Student Government Association May Day Evaluation Committee.

Following the preference (54-15) of questioned adults who had attended last year's indoor program in Recreation Hall, Miss Janjigian said the Saturday afternoon ceremony will be held outdoors, if possible.

"The major expense of the program is setting up the bleachers," Mrs. R. Mae Shultz, assistant to the dean of women, told the Senate.

This expense will account for \$600 of the year's total May Day budget of \$1000.

The ceremony will honor both old and newly tapped hatwomen as any other woman student who has been of service to the University, Miss Janjigian said.

She hopes to be able to use the Redifer area for a weekend display of art created by women students.

One hundred sixty-nine May Day evaluation questionnaires were sent out and 91 replies received. Miss Janjigian consulted with a campus questionnaire expert before sending out the forms, complete with stamped self-addressed envelopes.

To the question, "Did you think the May Day Program served a purpose?" 65 replied yes, 4 no. To the follow-up question, "Did it fulfill its purpose?" 48 answered in the affirmative, 7 were indifferent and 16 thought it did not.

Thirty-four people said they would like to meet the May Queen and her court; 28 were indifferent and 17 did not want to meet her.

Asked "Do you think there is enough for the parents to do on Saturday?" 54 replied yes, 2 were

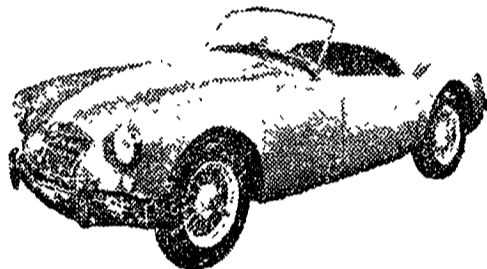
indifferent and 14 said no. Forty-nine said there was enough to do on Sunday, 3 were indifferent and 13 said there was not enough.

The jesters impressed the lowest number of people (24), followed by the folk dances (40)

and the background information by the narrator (42).

Listed as most impressive were the honor arch (65), coronation ceremony (65), evergreen chain (62) and the queen's procession (65).

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Trio Tickets to Go on Sale

The goal for the entire Larry Sharp Week drive is \$7000.

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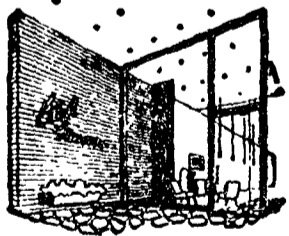
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
