

Limits May Be Lifted On Political Spending

Cabinet to Vote On Amendment

Campus political parties may be able to spend as much money as they wish in the coming spring elections, if All-University Cabinet approves a recommendation to that effect.

All-University Elections Committee voted last night to recommend to Cabinet that limits for campaign expenditures be lifted. The suggestion was passed with an almost unanimous vote.

Committee members felt that the expense limits forced parties to hunt for ways to avoid reporting purchases to the committee. They either double billed items or else went out of town to buy them.

The purchasing limits, according to the present election code, are \$150 for fall elections and \$400 in the spring. If cabinet votes to approve the recommendation the code will be amended to abolish the limits.

The committee also decided to recommend that voting be decentralized again this semester. Decentralized voting was tried last semester for the first time in many years and found to be satisfactory. Some members felt that voting should be held in classroom building and in the Hertz Union Building rather than in living units.

By these measures it is hoped that the voting percentage will increase.

Election dates were tentatively set for April 15, 16 and 17. Although the HUB will be occupied by Career Day expositions at that time, one committee member reported that Jack Kendall, president of the Engineering and Architecture Student Council, said there would be room for voting in the HUB.

Lynn Ward, chairman, said she would investigate both the possibility of renting voting machines or using the IBM machine in Old Main to tabulate votes. It would probably cost too much to buy voting machines, she said.

Liquor Sales Were Banned

Mrs. Ruth Arnold, IFCPA manager, said she was pleased with the turnout last evening, after the fair got off to a slow start yesterday afternoon.

President Eric A. Walker is one of 14 American businessmen and educators nominated for the 11th Annual Horatio Alger Award given by the American Schools and Colleges Association.

Six student leaders here are among the 2600 leaders on 400 college campuses who will participate in the election of one of the nominees for the award. These students will choose eight of the 14 men to be further considered for the award.

Dr. Milton Eisenhower, past president of the University, is a previous winner of the award. Other winners include Harold E. Stassen, Bernard Baruch, Charles L. Kettering, Charles E. Wilson, Dr. Ralph Bunche, Conrad Hilton, Capt. Eddie Rickenbacker and Herbert Hoover.

The Horatio Alger Awards Committee of the American Schools and Colleges Association is a non-profit corporation designed to foster the "American tradition of opportunities and rewards for ability and hard work."
