Boards Give Penalties To 112 Coeds

Freshman Regulations Board and the Women's Student Government Association Judicial Board of Review issued 105 blackmarks, 6 one o'clock removals and 1 lenient weekend campus this week.

The Freshman Board gave a total of 77 penalties; the upper-class judicial board gave 35.

Thirty blackmarks were given for forgetting to sign in or out; 35 for lateness of from one to four minutes; 12 for excessive noise; five for incorrect signing out; five for unexcused absences from residence hall meetings; three for wearing Bermuda shorts in the lounge; two for returning to date after signing in; and one for not having room ready for cleaning.

Freshman Regulations Board issued a blackmark to each of two freshman women who attended sorority coffee hours and were five and eight minutes late respectively in returning to their residence hall.

Three women students were given one o'clock removals this weekend for an accumulation of four blackmarks.

The Judicial Board issued a lenient weekend campus to a coed who signed out for the weekend but neglected to return the postcard addressed to her home and the pink sign-out slip to her hostess. The post card and sign-out slip were found in her desk.

In reply, Bernreuter said he had the authority from two directions, as top person under the president for student affairs, and as administrator of policy set by the Senate Committee on Student Affairs.

He said the Senate committee had the power to override his decision but "I can't believe the committee would recognize such reckless authority as displayed by the club."

Explaining background on the ruling, Bernreuter said that when the club was about \$1600 in debt, the administration aided it in planning the Stan Kenton and Four Freshman concerts.

"It was my understanding," he said, "that when the club was once out of the hole, it wouldn't continue with any big programs."

He said he was shocked to hear of plans for the Staton concert and he took action to stop it.

George L. Donovan, coordinator of Associated Student Activities, backed Bernreuter. He said: "I should think the club should be able to gamble with the \$1600 it now has but not for \$3500 which the Staton concert might cost."

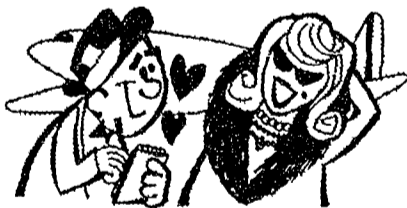

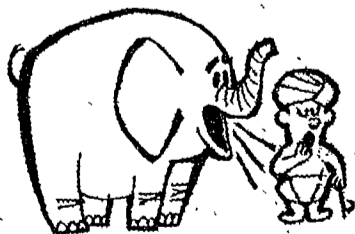

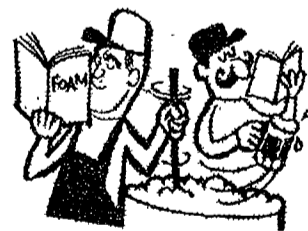
