

# Artist Series To Include Jazz

The Artist Series will include one and possibly two major jazz concerts next year.

The series committee is negotiating to obtain the Miles Davis Quintet for Saturday, Nov. 14.

Mrs. Nina C. Brown, administrative assistant of the series,

said there will definitely be one concert but beyond that there is nothing concrete.

One possibility, she said, is that the series could combine with Spring Week to bring in a jazz group.

"For this reason we have set aside May 1, 1960, as a tentative date for a concert," she said. This is the date of Spring Weekend.

"We would like to bring in some group that plays traditional jazz," Mrs. Brown said. "This would be the type the Jazz Club couldn't afford, that is, a good jazz group but one not necessarily a big seller."

Ben Euwema, dean of the College of the Liberal Arts and Artist Series chairman, said he did not think the concerts would compete at all with those of the Jazz Club.

He said it was the series' purpose to bring in groups that the Jazz Club could not afford.

Mrs. Brown added that the series would not sponsor such groups as the Kingston Trio or the Four Freshmen.

Peter Duncan, former president of the Jazz Club, said: "The prime purpose of the club is to bring jazz groups to campus. If the Artist Series does this, it is aiding us in accomplishing that goal."

If one or two groups are obtained through the series, he added, arrangements could be made so that the dates would not conflict.

# 12 Alumni Scholars Get 4.0 Averages

President Eric A. Walker has announced that twelve of the 57 undergraduates who hold Alumni Memorial Scholarships completed the fall semester with perfect 4.0 averages.

He also reported that 28 of the 57 attained averages of 3.50 or better, qualifying them for dean's list for the semester.

Dorothy Becker, a senior in education, has attained an All-University average of 3.96 during her first seven semesters.

The scholarship program, started five years ago, is supported by funds contributed by graduates of the University.

Each year 15 students are chosen from those recommended to the University by local alumni clubs.

The scholarships, renewed each year if the student continues to meet academic requirements, provide an annual grant of about \$350.

# Professor Recalls Days She Accompanied Jussi Bjoerling

Myrtle E. Swanson, associate professor of foods and nutrition will re-live a little of the past Sunday night when Jussi Bjoerling sings at 8 p.m. in Recreation Hall.

Thirty-nine years ago, when

Miss Swanson was just out of

music school, she accompanied a touring quartet—a young boy singing treble, his two brothers and their father.

The treble voice was that of Jussi Bjoerling—now acclaimed as the world's leading operatic tenor.

Miss Swanson once played for the Bjoerling Male Quartet during their 1919-1920 tour of small Swedish communities. The quartet put on their concerts in native costumes in churches and town halls.

In 1920, they came to Iron River, Mich. Miss Swanson's home was a mile away. The group did not have an official accompanist and relied on the town in which they were playing to supply one. Miss Swanson was selected to

play in Iron City.

For an hour and a half, before a crowd of perhaps 200 in the town hall, Miss Swanson accompanied the now famous tenor and his family as they sang a group of folk songs.

But the one night stand ended and Miss Swanson forgot the small quartet. Only recently was she reminded that she had played for the man who many rank among the top three active opera singers in the world.

She said she will be in Recreation Hall to hear the tenor on Sunday; however, she doesn't know if she will meet him. She doubted if he would remember her. "After all," she said, "he's been all over the world."

# WUS to Aid Needy With Annual Drive

The World University Service will hold its annual drive to aid underprivileged students and teachers from May 10 to 17.

This is the second drive of the World University Service at Penn State. The Professor Snarf contest, to elect "the

most lovable prof," an auction and a jam session will help to raise funds. A cookie sale and a car wash may be held also.

According to last year's chairman, Joyce Basch, junior in liberal arts from Scranton, over \$800 was raised last year through the Professor Snarf contest and contributions from campus organizations. Most of the money raised this year will go to Asia, which has the greatest need for educational facilities.

The goal of the World University Service is to "assist the international student community." It offers scholarships, aids in building classrooms and housing facilities, printing textbooks, buying school supplies, and caring for

students who are ill or wounded.

The World University Service was started shortly after World War I to give relief to the students of war-torn Europe and Asia Minor. Today it works through forty national committees to support persons interested in getting an education.
