

Delta Chi, Barracudas Clinch IM Swim Titles

Delta Chi once again outdid itself as the impregnable natators swept four firsts out of five to topple Phi Kappa Psi, 30-10, and clinch the fraternity intramural swimming championships.

With the independent championship hanging on the outcome of the 120-yard freestyle relay, the Barracudas came through in strong form as they edged past the Doubtful Dolphins, 22-19, to pick up the all-important victory.

Mike Stollmeyer and Rae Seely started the romp off for Delta Chi as Stollmeyer splashed to a :32.7 timing in the 60-yard freestyle with Seely trailing closely behind.

In the backstroke, the same story was repeated as Bob Schiffner cut through the 60-yard stretch in :39.6 to cop first place.

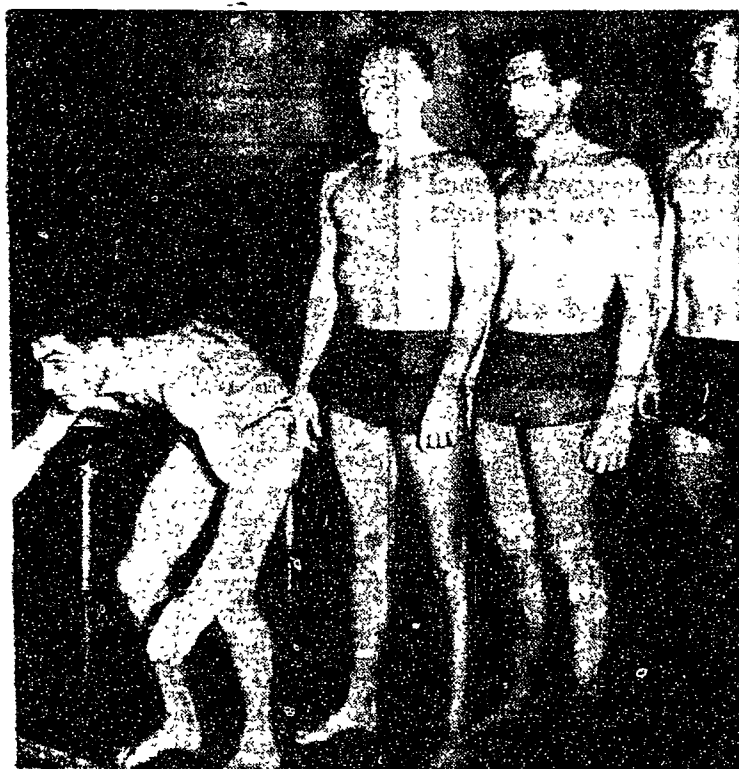
Delta Chi had no trouble at all with the breaststroke as Jim Hepler chalked up an easy win with a :40.2 clocking.

As usual, Delta Chi was nowhere in diving as Phi Kappa Psi made its only heavy marks in the scoring column on this event with Dick Gross and Tim Booher tying for first.

But it was the 120-yard freestyle that Delta Chi really came through as the team of Stollmeyer, Schiffner, Hepler and Nutter once again came through with amazing speed as they copped an easy first with a :58.5 timing.

Where the Delta Chi mermen made a one-sided show out of the fraternity championships, the independent finals was a tie for the Barracudas.

The 60-yard backstroke event was clinched by Bill Barber of completely different story as the Barracudas made a come-

from-behind rally to eke out a 22-19 victory over the Doubtful Dolphins.

In the freestyle event it was a neck and neck battle between Rich Splenda of the Barracudas and Don Butcher of the Doubtful Dolphins, but Splenda turned on the power in the last few yards to edge out Butcher with a :34.5 timing. Don Rhodes picked up the Barracudas in a :44.4 clocking. Bob Curtis and Art Whitfield tal-

lied second and third places, respectively, for the Doubtful Dolphins.

At the breaststroke mark, the Dolphins began to draw close as Steve Sulzbacher scored a first with a 45.4. However, a strategic move by the Barracudas which pulled Splenda out of his usual slot of anchor man on the freestyle relay team, proved to be a success. He splashed in second ahead of the Dolphins' Sam MacMullan.

The Dolphins pulled ahead of the Barracudas in the diving as John Johnson toted an 11.5 scoring to top the Barracuda's Ted Laubach who pulled a 7.0.

Down 19-17 going into the 120-yard freestyle relay, the Barracudas once again made their move as in previous meets as the team of Barber, Rhodes, Jay Huffman and Laubach swam their way to a 1:07 clocking and the independent championship.

Also in the unlimited class, Ron Alleman, Delta Theta Sigma, had little trouble as he decided Phil Kreitner of Tau Kappa Epsilon, 7-2.

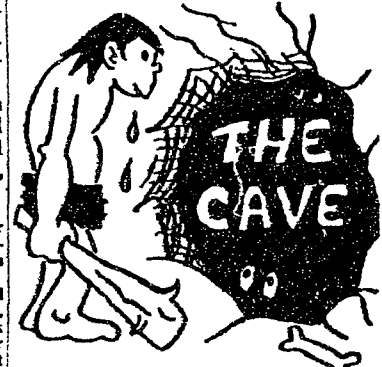
