

SDX Plans Probe Skit at Banquet

Members of the University's administration and faculty, as well as the academic facilities of the University, will come under the eyes of an investigation committee from Washington as it looks for a guided missile site.

The investigation will be made in the form of a skit given by members of Sigma Delta Chi, men's professional journalism fraternity, at the 23rd annual Gridiron Banquet scheduled for Sunday, April 4, in the State College Hotel.

The stag banquet, a traditional campus event, was dropped by the group in 1954. It will be resumed this year in the hopes of continuing the tradition.

Members of the University administration from President Eric A. Walker on down, as well as

faculty members and student leaders, have been sent invitations to attend.

The banquet is patterned after a similar event staged each year in Washington by the National Press Club. Similar banquets are also given by members of the press corps covering state governments.

The National Gridiron Banquet given in Washington, is the press' way of making fun of government agencies and officials from President Dwight D. Eisenhower on down. Often the President and other officials are hurled good-natured insults through the humor of the newsmen in their skit.

It is the only chance the newspapermen have to let their hair down and really blast high officials. The Penn State Gridiron

banquet, although operating on a smaller scale, has the same purpose.

This year's skit, poking fun at the actions of administration and faculty members, has been written by David Fineman, senior in journalism from Pittsburgh, and Richard Drayne, senior in arts and letters from Pittsburgh.

Following the skit, a rebuttal will be given by a high administration official.

Tickets are \$3.25 each, and admission is by printed invitation only.
