 not prevalent throughout the nation.  
 "I know there are many places where there is too much pressure," he said, "but I think the athletic programs at most universities are well run."  
 What about the pressures that do exist today?  
 McCoy feels they come from several sources, including the institution itself.  
 "There is no question in my mind that the institutions are partly responsible for the pressures that we have in inter-collegiate competition today," McCoy said.  
 "In addition, there are the many Quarterback Clubs, which can only see that a team must win all the time. And the newspapers are to blame, too, for they become very critical of a situation when a team does not win enough games.  
 "On top of all these pressures, there is the pressure on the coach. He knows he has to win or he'll be fired so he goes out after the blue chip like the others," McCoy said

 LaBar then gave up his chair and asked council not to bind him because he felt he would be better able to represent agriculture students if he wasn't bound to vote against reorganization.  
 He said, "All I can give you is my guarantee that unless it (reorganization) improves I won't be for it." James Collins, senior in general agriculture from Sarver, then said, "If we bind him to vote 'no' we won't get anything more than we have now."

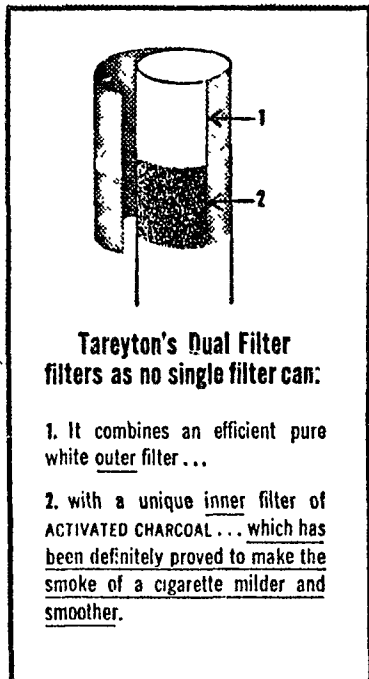
