

# Bypass to Open 'Consumer Problems' Is HEc Theme Near Lewistown

Students traveling eastward will avoid the congestion of Lewistown traffic this summer when a 5-mile 4-lane bypass around the area will be opened by the Department of Highways.

The bypass, completed at a cost of \$55 million, is the largest single improvement in recent years along Route 322. During the past five years the state has spent more than \$16 million on improvements along the road. Officially known as the 28th Division Highway in Pennsylvania, it starts in Atlantic City and ends in Cleveland.

Other projects on the highway include:

- \$185 million project to convert the two lanes between Meadville and Conneaut Lake into a 4-lane divided highway.
- A \$1 million realigning and lengthening project of six and a half miles in Chester County northwest of Downingtown.
- A \$1.3 million project south of West Chester where two lanes are being converted to four.

Since 1953 the department has contracted for 20 projects in addition to performing normal maintenance and resurfacing. The contracts range from the Lewistown bypass construction to a \$65,000 resurfacing job in Clearfield County.

Only 20 miles of the highway were four lanes wide last May. Another 51 miles contained three lanes. Twenty percent of the route in Pennsylvania is 20 feet wide or less. Current construction will nearly double the existing four lane mileage.

The busiest point on 322 is on Paxton Street in Harrisburg where the average daily traffic is 23,690 vehicles a day. At the least busy point, between James-town and Hartstown in Crawford County, the average daily traffic is 1110 vehicles.

The stretch of highway believed to be the longest in use without modernization is in Clarion. Less than one mile in length, it was constructed in 1919.

Since Route 322 is on the federal aid primary system, projects which meet federal standards are eligible for a 50 per cent subsidy.

"Consumer Problems of Families" will be the theme of the 10th annual Home Economics Spring Weekend to be held April 17 and 18.

The theme of the conference will be carried out in special programs held every hour. These programs are designed to appeal to various interest groups composed of adult consumers, professional people and high school students.

The programs will feature speakers on housing, family economics, equipment, child development and family relationships, social security, foods and nutrition, textiles and clothing, the working mother, the changing consumer and today's economic conditions. Dr. Edwin G. Nourse, visiting professor of economics, will speak on "Responsibility for Administering the Family Income" at 4 p.m. Friday in Schwab Auditorium. Friday evening, a panel of specialists in marketing from Kansas, Iowa, Indiana, Washington, D.C., and The Sperry and Hutchinson Company will discuss the questionable value of trading stamps to the consumer.

The panel will be moderated jointly by Dr. Marjorie East, head of the Department of Home Economics Education, and a member of the executive board of the National Council on Consumer Information.

Many features have been especially designed to interest teen-agers. These features include a panel which will discuss "Money Ways for Teen Days"

and a demonstration on "Have Food—Will Party." Staff members of News and Views, the home economics publication, will have an exhibit with the theme, "Look What Happens to the Coed's Dollar." Tours of the campus and the home management houses are planned for the high school students.

Talks based on research in the College of Home Economics are planned to aid professional home economists in their service to families.

An event designed to appeal to all groups is the talk of Miss Barbara Sampson, home economist with General Foods. She will speak on the reactions of Polish people at the International Trade Fair.
