

## **Veterans Said to Be Better Students** reterans make better scholastic conclude that military service seconds than do non-veterans, he contributes, rather than detracts than detracts from the shifter of the shi

Young men are better prepared to take advanage o higher education after military service than they are before Dr. Robert G. Bernreuter, dear of admissions and specia assistant for student affairs, told a Congressional subcommittee.

"It is now clear that veteran have shown themselves to be bet ter students than non-veteran through their more serious applications to studies, through their earning of higher grades, through smaller drop-out rate, and through better discipline and citizenship," Bernreuter said.
In testifying before the Sen-

ate Subcommittee on Veterans Affairs March 25 in Washington, Bernreuter said he would give preference to those students seeking admission to the University who have served on active duty in the Armed Forces. "This policy of giving preference to a veteran is not based upon sentimentality," he said.

But this policy is based upon the results of studies contrasting the accomplishments of veterans with non-veterans. A University study just completed shows that


"Another indication of the exent to which veterans make better use of their opportunities is hown in the percentage of stulents who quit before graduating. Among last year's freshmen nore than one-third of the non-veterans quit while less than one-fourth of the veterans did not eturn." he said.

Still another reason for any contributes, rather than detracts from, the ability of young men to derive the maximum benefit from higher education, he said.

Bernreuter testified on Senate Bill 1138 which would continue "GI Bill" benefits to veterans during peace as well as war time. The University was one of four schools represented at the hearing.

Still another reason for preferring veterans has been found through a study of disciplinary actions the University has had to take involving undergraduate students, Bernreuter said. Out of 1587 veterans enrolled at the University, only four were involved in disciplinary actions, he said.

Veterans consistently receive higher ratings in desirable attributes than do students who have not had military experience Bernreuter said. From this we
