

Plan May Split Sales Tax Bill Into Two Parts

HARRISBURG (AP)—A proposal to break the 3½ per cent sales tax bill into two or three bills was one of the two plans offered yesterday in an effort to end a legislative deadlock on the measure.

The other plan was offered by three Democratic rebels who have refused to support the 3½ per cent sales tax bill proposed by Gov. Lawrence. The three, who voted against the 3½ per cent tax when it was defeated in the House March 19, introduced a plan for a 2 per cent general sales tax. They are Reps. Austin J. Murphy, Washington County; Louis Rovanssek, Cambria County; and Frank M. O'Neil, Clearfield County.

The 2 per cent plan won little sympathy from leaders of either party.

Under the piecemeal approach the first, and basic bill, would raise the rate to 3½ per cent and extend it to include the least controversial items that Gov. Lawrence's Tax Advisory Committee recommended be taxed.

Republicans Unsure On Convention Site

WASHINGTON (AP)—A site committee hit a snag yesterday in considering a city for the 1960 Republican national convention and put off a decision until Saturday.

Although Chicago was reported still leading four other cities for the convention, the site committee chairman—Ray C. Bliss of Ohio—said certain checks had to be made as to fringe benefits in Chicago and other cities before a final recommendation.

Bliss said some of the items to be checked are whether the national committee or the city will pay for hotel facilities for party headquarters, whether a hall is to be provided rent free to the committee and whether special bus service would be provided to the convention hall.

Rocket Cone Called Success

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP)—An ICBM nose cone of tomorrow was fired 5000 miles down the Atlantic aboard a powerful Thor-Able rocket yesterday and plucked out of the depths in a completely successful mission.

When the cone was hauled onto the deck of an Air Force ship near Ascension Island two hours after launching, it marked the first time that recovery was accomplished on a flight close to the intercontinental range.

The spectacular shoot in the early morning hours was the seventh nose cone re-entry flight close to intercontinental range in a year.

Air Force officials said the main objective was to receive telemetry—an electronic picture—of the cone's re-entry through the earth's atmosphere. The recovery was an additional bonus that would prove out the telemetry data received, they added.

The Thor-Able, a time-tested, 80-foot, two-stage rocket planted the cone on target after a 5000-mile flight in minutes.

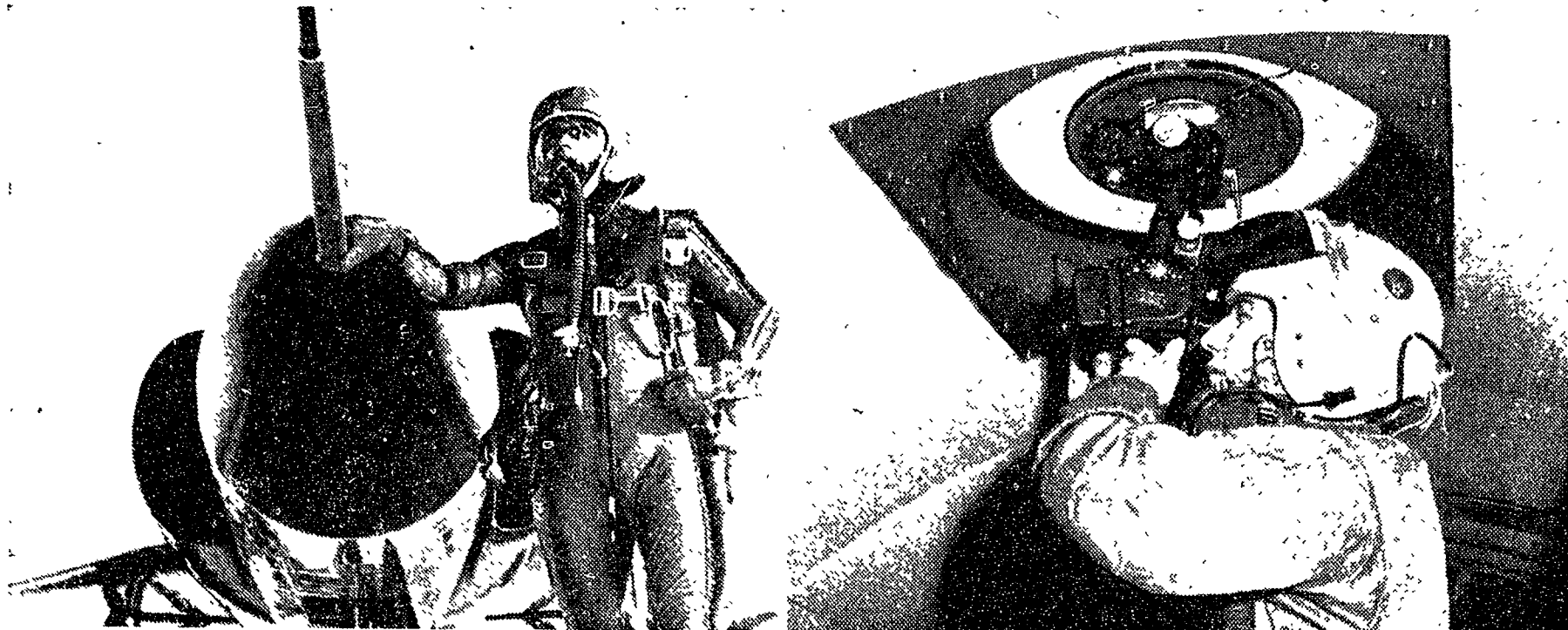
