

# Coach Sees 'Tonic' In LaX Slaughter

The cold, bleak weather of the past weekend could well reflect the feelings of the Penn State lacrosse team after the 29-3 drubbing they took from the Middies of Navy.

"We just didn't have it out there Saturday," reflected Lion Coach Earnie Baer.

"Our entire defensive setup fell to pieces and they walked all over us. The team froze up and couldn't do a thing right. In fact, they did things that they never did before which were completely wrong," Coach Baer said.

Baer stated that Navy had been well scouted and that the entire team had been practicing against plays they knew that the Middies would pull.

"But in the game it looked like they forgot everything we had gone over and allowed Navy to score more or less at will."

"However, the potential is still there and we could pull out of it yet. Although the loss to Navy was hard to take, it could be a good tonic for the remainder of the season," concluded Coach Baer.

The two Lion stars of the Loyola game, John Behne and Bob Swanson, were completely bottled up by the Navy aggregate. In fact, Swanson was forced to sit out the last half of the game due to the recurrence of a painful charleyhorse. He'll be out of service for the Penn game tomorrow.

Behne was knocked out of every scoring play he attempted by the effective double teaming of the Middie defense. Only once could the Lion All-American break the Navy nets with a blazing shot early in the fourth period.

Jim Winpenny, however, was the first Nittany attackman to crack the Middie defense as he finally drove one home in the last minute of the third period. By this time, the Navy offense had compiled a 22 goal lead.

Chip Henderson pushed through the final goal for the Lions in the last few minutes of the final period.

Statistically the Lion stickmen came out on the short end all the way around. Navy fired 44 shots while the Lions could

A breakdown of times showed 1:57.5 for leadoff man Don Davies, 1:54.1 for Bill Schwab, 1:53.4 for Charlie King and 1:53 flat for Engelbrink. The combined time of 7:38 was just six-tenths of a second slower than the Quantico record for the distance.
