

Lions Top Bisons 8-7, for 2nd Win

Kikla Triumphs In Relief Role

There are two ways to win a ball game—the hard and easy ways. Penn State's baseball team has proved one thing in its first two outings, it can win them the hard way.

Yesterday the Lions came from three runs back to nip Bucknell, 8-7, in extra innings at Beaver Field. They did just about the same thing in the opener last week against Gettysburg.

A stubby little southpaw pitcher, Ed Kikla, was the big hero in yesterday's error marred game. He pitched four innings of hitless relief ball and got credit for his first win.

Kikla, a sophomore, came in the seventh inning after the Bisons had sent Ron Riese and Bob Arner to the shower. And he managed to end Bucknell's rally which had put them in front, 7-4.

Larry Fegley brought the Lions within two runs in the Lion seventh, with an inside the park home run that rolled deep into left center field Fegley, incidentally, continued his fine hitting going 4 for 6 with two more RBI's. He now is hitting .750 and has 6 RBI's.

Kikla set down the Bisons without any trouble in the eighth, but the Lions couldn't push anything across in their half.

Then came the wild ninth inning where the Lions tied things. Doug Caldwell, who was playing in center field, led off with a walk and moved to third on Harry Beans' single. Larry

Beighey struck out and Kikla moved in to hit.

He sent a foul ball deep behind first base and Doug Caldwell had time to tag up on third and come in to score. Dick Landis walked and it was Ron Rinker's turn with the stick.

He sent a sharp grounder to the left of Bucknell shortstop Ellis Harley who couldn't hold it. He then took the ball and threw

Each Penn State player followed Bibleheimer in doing a repeat performance in blanking out his opponent in the first set.

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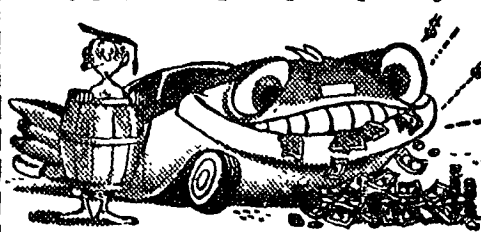
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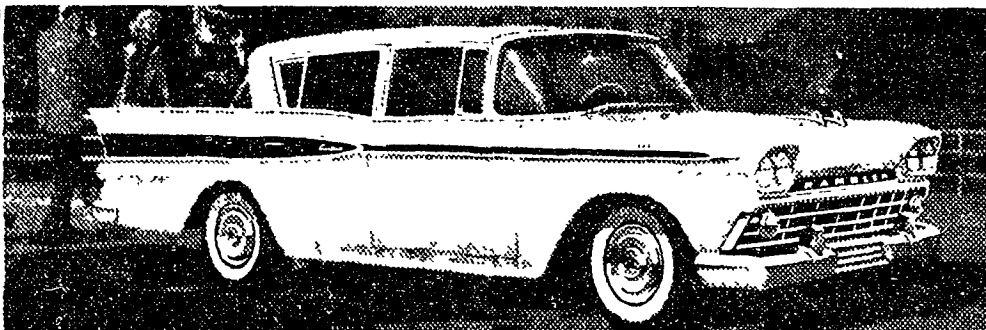
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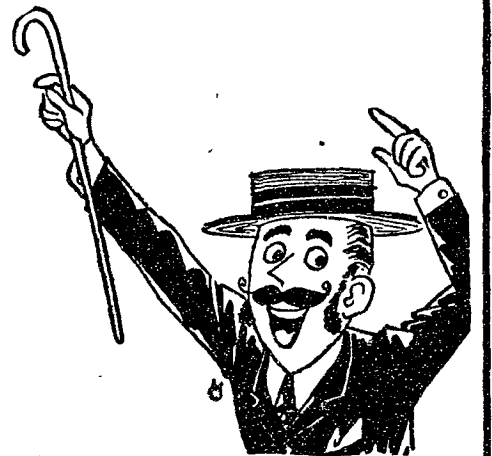
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
