

Tribute Paid to Dulles For Years of Service

WASHINGTON (AP)—A rich reward came yesterday to John Foster Dulles, easing his sadness and pain.

It was a flowers-for-the-living tribute that few men get to see and hear; an outpouring of thanks for untiring public service.

The tribute was in the glint of tears in President Eisenhower's eyes as he broke to news in Augusta, Georgia, that the secretary of state was too ill to go on.

It was in the glowing words of praise, of regret, of appreciation, admiration and even love, used by men regardless of politics to say how deeply they felt.

"People all over the world," Vice President Richard M. Nixon said, "owe him a debt they can never repay adequately for his courageous and dedicated fight for a world of freedom, justice and peace."

Democrat Sam Rayburn of Texas, speaker of the House, commented: "Not only is he a man

of great ability, but also a fine gentleman. I think the necessity of his resignation will bring about universal regret."

Sens. Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas and Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois, the Senate's Democratic and Republican leaders, took the floor of the Senate to elaborate on comments they had made earlier, as soon as the news had come in. So did other senators.

Johnson put it this way: "Secretary Dulles will remain in our hearts as a great American who faced up to difficult and trying tasks with fortitude and with resolution."

USAF Challenges Berlin Flight Rule

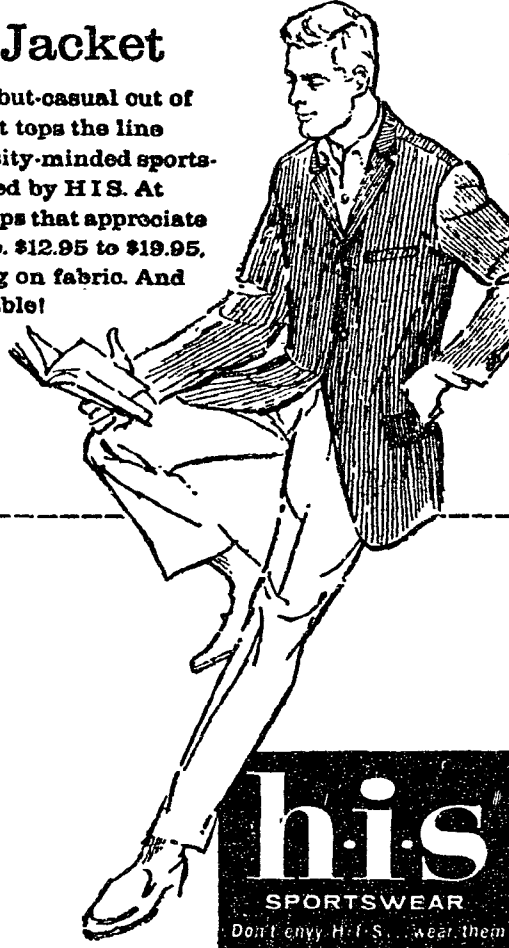
BONN, Germany (AP) — The U.S. Air Force yesterday sent its third high-flying transport within a month to Berlin in defiance of a Soviet 10,000-foot ceiling. Soviet jets shadowed the plane but did not buzz it as on two previous occasions. U.S. officials said.

The new Air Force flight raised misgivings in Britain. Authoritative sources said Britain is worried lest a U.S.-Soviet flareup in the air corridor imperil an East-West summit meeting this year.

On both legs of the flight through the corridor over Communist East Germany the plane was closely shadowed by two Soviet MIG fighters, U.S. officials said.
