whistles: •ALERT: steady blast for 3 to 5 minutes, During this alert, resi-dents should tune their radios to the Conelrad stations-640 or 1240 kilocycles-for emergency instructions

•TAKE COVER: short blasts for 3 minutes. At this signal, all vehicles on campus will come to a complete stop and all persons will take cover in the nearest build-

ALL CLEAR: one steady blast which means that normal activities may be resumed.

Immediately upon the signaling of the first alert, all members of the Disaster Planning Council should be present at their designated posts.
