

A-Energy to Become Useful Soon—Deasy

"Atomic energy will not have to wait a half century before making appreciable inroads into the high-cost portion of the electric generation industry of Pennsylvania," says Dr. George F. Deasy, professor of geography.

Deasy, speaking before the Pennsylvania Academy of Sciences recently, challenged the currently prevalent thesis that atomic energy in Pennsylvania is degree of efficiency that it probably will not be faced with competition from atomic power for decades to come, according to fossil fuels and falling water.

He cited statistics gathered by himself and a co-worker, Dr. Phyllis R. Griess, associate professor of geography, on the "Competitive Capabilities of Pennsylvania's Electric Generation Plants."

They have analyzed certain aspects of Pennsylvania's electric generation plants, including among other items, a station-by-station evaluation of costs of power production. Their cost production data covers 122 conventionally fueled plants, representing almost 90 per cent of the total generating capacity of the state.

Although atomic energy in Pennsylvania may not be too far off, the great bulk of the generation capacity of the Common-

wealth has achieved such a high degree of efficiency that it probably will not be faced with competition from atomic power for decades to come, according to Deasy.

He concluded that "there are today many economically vulnerable individual conventional generation plants in the state. A not-too-distant tomorrow will find atomic competition increasingly stiffer, for the construction and operation expense curves for atomic plants are declining sharply, whereas equivalent curves for conventional plants are rising."

Deasy and Dr. Griess are probably the first in the state to study this question on a plant-to-plant basis. They became interested through a study of the coal mining industry five years ago. This led to electric generation, which in turn, led to a study of atomic energy.

votes sitting in the Assembly for a term of one year.

d) Each political party may nominate three Juniors for the Junior seats with the four receiving the highest number of votes sitting in the Assembly for a term of one year.

e) Each political party may nominate two Seniors for the Senior seats with the two receiving the highest number of votes sitting in the Assembly for a term of one year.

f) The members of the Assembly elected during the spring semester 1959 shall hold their seats in addition to the members of the Assembly elected in the fall semester 1959.

g) The President of the Sophomore Class and the President of the Freshman Class shall be elected in the fall semester 1959 elections. Both shall sit in the Assembly.

h) Until the elections in the fall semester 1959 the assembly shall sit as an interim body. After the elections in the fall semester 1959 the Assembly shall assume full powers as specified in the constitution.

Section 3.

All members of the Executive Branch shall sit as Interim officers until the elections in the fall semester 1959 at which time they shall assume full powers as specified in the constitution.

Section 4.

All actions of the Legislative Branch and the Executive Branch shall be subject to ratification by SGA following the elections in the fall semester 1959.

Section 5.

a) The Judicial Branch shall sit as an interim body until the elections in the fall semester 1959 at which time they shall assume full powers as specified in the constitution.

b) All actions of the Judicial Branch with the exception of disciplinary actions shall be subject to ratification following the elections in the fall semester 1959.

c) Until after the elections in

the fall semester 1959 no disciplinary action made by the Judicial Branch shall be effective unless approved by the administration.

Section 6.

This article shall be stricken from the constitution after the elections in the fall semester 1959 and shall be null and void following the elections in the fall semester 1959.

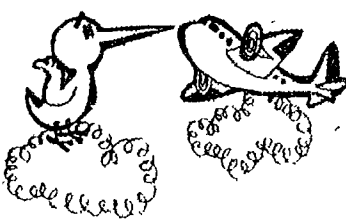

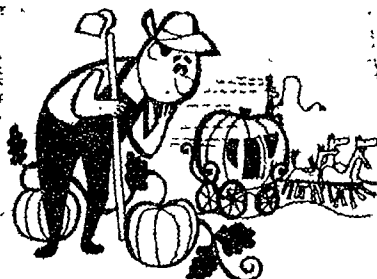

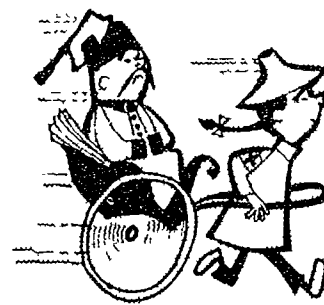

English: ORIENTAL AMBULANCE



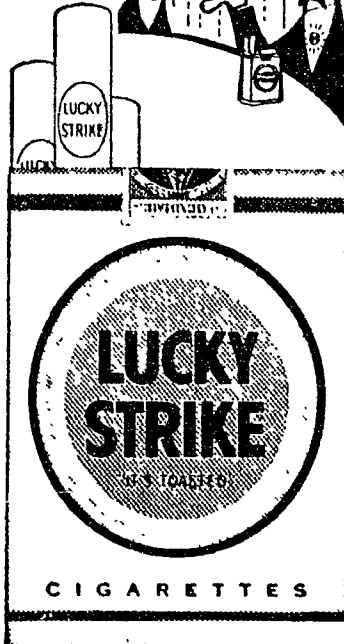
