

# Thespians to Copy Broadway With 'Boy Friend' Premier

A Broadway style premier with all the trimmings will open "The Boy Friend" on May 7 at Schwab Auditorium.

Lights will be directed on the front of the auditorium and the stars will be interviewed as they arrive in cars of the 1920's.

The musical was written by an Englishman, Sandy Wilson, in 1953 as a parody on the English music in the 1920's. The show first opened in an off-beat theater in London and later moved to the West-end, the equivalent of New

York's Broadway. When "The Boy Friend" came to New York, Julie Andrews played the lead role and as a result of her performance was given the lead in "My Fair Lady."

When the show opens on the mall Mother's Day Weekend, Carlene Rarick, sophomore in arts and letters from Seaford, Del., will play the lead role.

The 15-member cast will not only act but will also provide the singing and dancing popular in the Charleston era of short dresses and flappers.

Carmen Cavuto, orchestra director at the College Area High School, will play the banjo with the 14-piece orchestra led by James Sugart, junior in

music education from Huntingdon.

The set and costumes were designed by Russell Whalley, assistant professor of theatre arts. The framework of the unit set will be used throughout the show but the door decorations, properties and lighting will be changed in each act to correspond with the setting change.

Robert Reifsneider, assistant professor of theatre arts, is directing the Thespian production.

# Lott Calls Tension Hazard to Students

Periods of tension and nervousness are an occupational hazard for students, according to Dr. George M. Lott, University psychiatrist.

In an attempt to help students who are frustrated and have emotional problems, Lott founded Penn State's Mental Hygiene Clinic 12 years ago.

One example of a student with an emotional problem is the student who because of tension and nervousness "blows up" during examinations, he said. "This fear of tests seems to afflict most students and is probably an occupational disease," he added.

The Mental Hygiene Clinic, located on the second floor of Ritenour Health Center, works closely with the Psychology Clinic, the Division of Counseling and student advisers, he said.

These services usually arrange appointments with the Mental Hygiene Clinic if it is felt that a student needs extra consultation. He emphasized that those students who go to the clinic are not abnormal.

Lott said that the clinic advised 300 students last year. He added that there are only about 10 to 20 breakdowns every year.

The demand for service, however, has grown faster than the clinic staff, limiting the number of students that the clinic can assist. Until two years ago, Lott

was the only person on the staff. Today three others work with him.

Employed at the clinic as a full time psychiatrist is Dr. John D. Walmer. Dr. Clifford R. Adams, professor of psychology, is a part time clinic psychologist. His specialty is marriage counseling.

The fourth member of the staff is Elinor Westerfield, a social worker. She also works with the Psychology Clinic, which provides educational and vocational guidance as well as personal adjustment counseling.

In some cases graduate students studying for their doctorate in psychology are used as assistants, Dr. Lott said.

In a recent study conducted by Eugene Gilbert and Co., noted teenage research authorities, teenagers were asked, "Did you read a newspaper yesterday?" Eight out of every ten replied that they had.

# Rustlers Take 1/2 Ton Steer From Farmer
