dents and is probably an occu-pational disease," he added.

The Mental Hygiene Clinic, located on the second floor of Ritenour Health Cennter, works closely with the Psychology Clinic, the Division of Counsel-

Clinic, the Division of Counseling and student advisers, he said.

These services usually arrange appointments with the Mental Hygiene Clinic if it is felt that a student needs extra consultation. He emphasized that those students who go to the clinic are not abnormal.

The fourth member of the staff is Elinor Westerfield, a social worker. She also works with the Psychology Clinic, which provides educational and vocational guidance as well as personal adjustment counseling.

In some cases graduate students studying for their doctorate in psychology are used as assistants, Dr. Lott said.
