

APhiO Honors Pauling--- Profs, Student

Alpha Phi Omega, men's service fraternity, recently awarded the Distinguished Service Key for outstanding service to campus and community to three faculty members and one student.

Those who received the awards were Dr. John H. Frizzell, retired professor emeritus of speech education; Professor H. Norton Copp, professor of forestry and advisor to the University's chapter of Alpha Phi Omega; Captain Gordon G. Brigham, USAF, instructor in AFROTC; and James Durham, senior in business administration from Lancaster.

The awards were presented during a banquet held on campus for the Eastern States Regional Conference of the fraternity on April 10-12. Among those attending the banquet were President Eric A. Walker and William S. Roth, national president of Alpha Phi Omega.

Now" in the hands of the United Nations Secretary-General. It had been signed by more than 11,000 scientists including 2000 from the United States.

His chapter on fallout tells of the increased probability of leukemia or bone cancer, because of the effects of radioactivity, in addition to affecting childbirth, sterility and mental health. He states that radioactive particles could kill 60,000 people within 15 years after the blast.

In the Vienna Declaration adopted by the participants of the Third Pugwash Conference, September, 1958, Pauling said that a nuclear war threat cannot ever cease but mutual cooperation among world nations will harness it.

While here on campus today, Pauling will lecture on "Abnormal Hemoglobin Molecules and Disease" in Osmond Laboratory at 3:15 p.m. besides the lecture in Schwab Auditorium tonight.

Several social and discussion meetings will also be held to allow anyone wishing to talk to the scientist to do so.

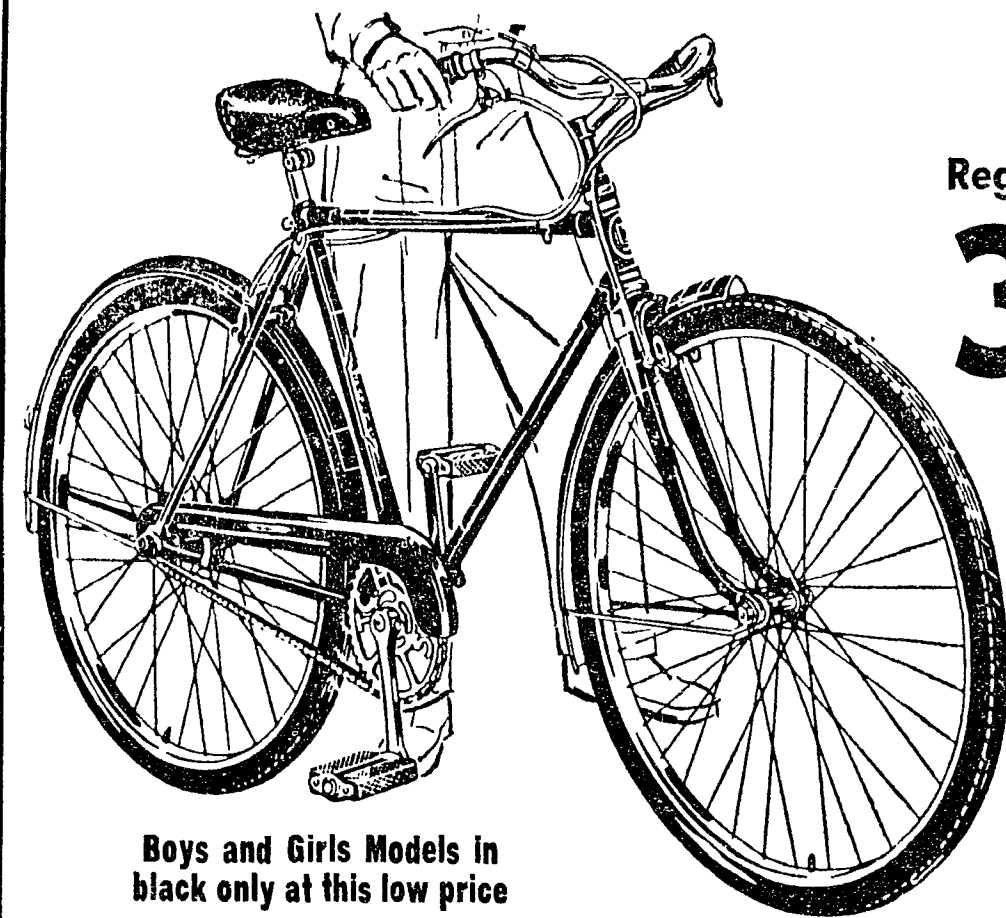
