

42nd Little International

Arnett Receives Grand Award

Lloyd Arnett, senior in animal husbandry from Mechanicsburg, Ohio, received the Grand Champion award Saturday at the 42nd Little International Livestock Show in the stock pavilion.

Arnett, who showed a quarter-horse mare, received the Grand Championship two years ago when he entered an Angus steer, and a reserved championship three years ago for a Hereford steer.

Reserved champion honors were earned by David Zerby, sophomore in pre-veterinary from State College. Zerby showed a Southdown sheep.

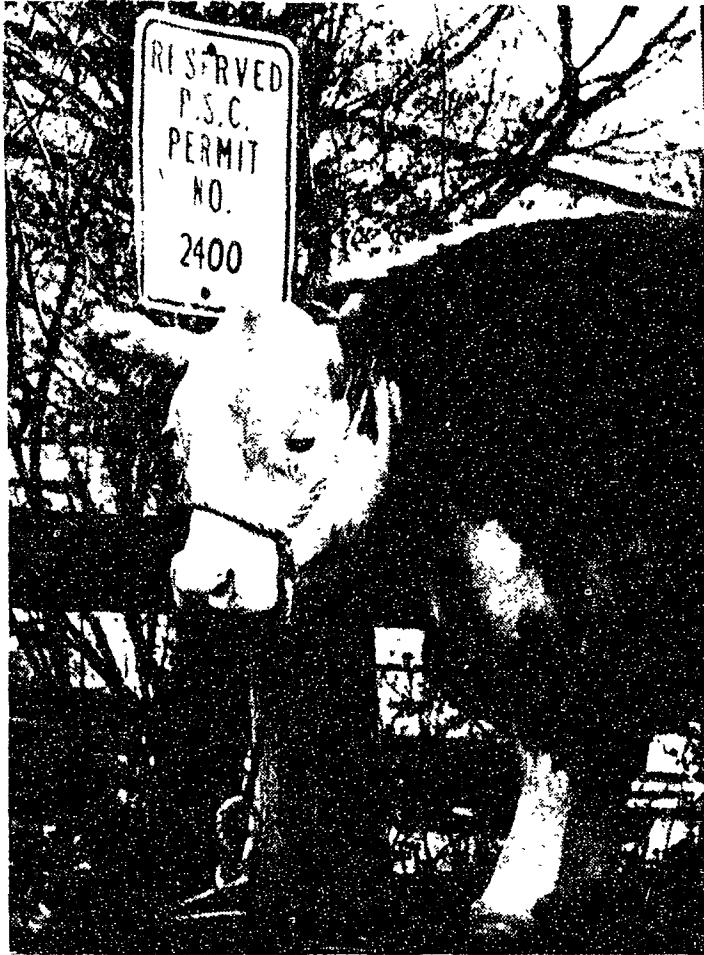
In order to compete in the grand champion contest, each entrant had to qualify as a champion in his own division, of which there were four: sheep, swine, cattle and horse.

Arnett placed first among 11 entrants in two classifications in the horse division. Zerby placed first out of 23 entrants in five classifications in the sheep division.

Barbara Clark, junior in animal husbandry from Ardmore, showed a champion Angus steer, winning first honors out of 48 entries and 10 classifications.

First honors in the swine division were earned by John Novak, sophomore in general agriculture from Export. Novak entered a Poland China swine which placed first out of 23 entries and five classes.

This year's Little International was dedicated to Richard S. Sour, an alumnus of the University. Sour, who owns an angus farm in Urbana, Ohio, won the Little International grand championship while a student. He also won the Grand Championship at the Chicago International in 1956. Sour




