Arnett Receives Grand Award

Lloyd Arnett, senior in animal husbandry from Mechanicsburg, Ohio, received the Grand Champion award Saturday at the 42nd Little Inter-. national Livestock Show in the stock pavilion.

Arnett, who showed a quarterhorse mare, received the Grand Championship two years ago when he entered an Angus steer, and a reserved championship three years ago for a Hereford steer.

Reserved champion honors were earned by David Zerby, sophomore in pre-veterinary from State College. Zerby showed a Southdown sheep.


In order to compete in the grand champion contest, each entrant had to qualify as a champion in his own division, of which there were four; sheep, swine, cattle and horse.
