Bridges Says Luce Will Do 'Good' Job

Clare Booth Luce, recently appointed ambassador to Brazil, is going to do a "good" job, according to Sen. Styles Bridges (R-N.H.).

Bridges, speaking at a press conference here yesterday, said Luce had done an excellent job while he was in Italy. Mrs. Luce was "in perfect control of the situation."

In reference to the attack made on Mrs. Luce by Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore.), Bridges said, "Of course all senators have the right to criticize but this went too far."

Turning to the coming presidential election, Bridges said the leading contender for the Republican nomination was Vice President Richard M. Nixon. However, he said that if Nelson Rockefeller, present governor of New York, decided to run he would also be a leading contender.

Bridges said he favored Nixon right now but would have to reserve his final opinion until "the cards are in."

When questioned on the Western package proposal to be presented at the Geneva conference, Bridges said, "I'm not concerned about a one package deal."

Specifically, Bridges was asked if he favored presenting the entire plan to the Soviet Union for either complete acceptance or complete rejection or presenting it to them in such a way as to allow them to accept or reject it in part.

Bridges said he did not favor the "take or leave it" way and felt the Soviet Union should be free to accept parts of it.

"You must have a set of principles and room within the scope of these principles to work on details," he said.

In reference to the revised Kennedy-Ervin Labor Bill which recently passed the Senate, Bridges said, "I voted for it because it was the best thing possible."

Bridges, agreeing with Presi-

dent Eisenhower, said the bill was not as strong in places as he would have preferred it to be.

Bridges said the bill did not effectively strengthen the law on secondary boycotting and other points; but it did "go a certain distance in correcting some glaring needs."

Among some of the "glaring needs" were, according to Bridges, the necessity of increasing the responsibility of the union to the working man and the necessity of re-electing union heads every year.

In referring to the nuclear test ban, Bridges favored the complete inspection plan and would not accept the recent Soviet proposal of limiting the number of checks. He said the testing of large atomic weapons should be stopped now.

However, he added, that the test of smaller weapons such as missiles should continue because "we're working toward a cleaner missile (with less fall out) and this is constructive."

On the proposed reduction of American ground forces in Europe, Bridges said that enough forces must be left there to maintain the "morale of those nations."

Dennis to Speak at Program Of 6th Annual Science Fair

Lawrence E. Dennis, vice president in charge of academic affairs, will speak at the awards program of the sixth annual Pennsylvania State Science Fair tomorrow.

The program will be held at 1:15 p.m. in Schwab Auditorium. Over 500 students from junior and senior high schools, including public, private and parochial schools, will begin to set up their exhibits today. Exhibits will include everything from fingerprinting, soil structure and underground atomic missile bases to effects of sounds on plants.

Preliminary judging of the exhibits will begin at 8 p.m. and the final judging will be held from 8:30 to 10 a.m. tomorrow.

The exhibits, which are in Whitmore and Buckhout Laboratories, will be open to the public from 1:30 to 5:30 p.m. tomorrow.

The Grand Champion of the fair will receive a \$500 Sylvania Electric Scholarship which may be used at the college or university of his choice. Two \$250 scholarships from the J. Paul Smith Memorial Fund will also be awarded. These must be used at the University.

A \$100 U.S. Savings Bond will be given to the junior high champion and 16 \$50 savings bonds to

the top winners in each of the various divisions.

Second and third place winners in each of the divisions will receive gold and silver medals respectively.

Dr. Charles L. Hosler, associate professor of meteorology, will present the awards at the program tomorrow. Faculty members will serve as judges on the Fair Committee.

Scholarships and awards, as well as other financial support for the program, are provided by state and local organizations.

The winner of last year's science fair was John D. Herold, a junior in Bradford Senior High School. His project concerned the effect of color on plant growth.

Pressure Gauge Given to University

A bottom-hole pressure gauge and free maintenance on it for lifetime has been presented to the Department of Petroleum and Natural Gas Engineering.

The delicate, precision gauge, valued at \$2175, was brought here by W. B. Kendall, production manager for Geophysical Research Corp., a subsidiary of the American Petroleum Co. The bottom-hole pressure gauge, which will measure and record pressures up to 16,000 lbs., is the prime source of engineering information available from oil wells.
