

Court Says Homes May Be Inspected

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Supreme Court ruled 5-4 yesterday that a health inspector may search your home without a warrant.

The dissenters said the decision "greatly dilutes the right of privacy which every homeowner had the right to believe was part of our American heritage."

Truman Rejects Bid to Dinner At White House

WASHINGTON (AP) — Harry S. Truman won't visit the White House he once occupied—even to meet his old friend Sir Winston Churchill.

The White House disclosed yesterday that Truman, who has not been on friendly terms with President Eisenhower since the 1952 campaign, sent his regrets when invited to attend a stag dinner Wednesday night in honor of the former British prime minister.

Truman confirmed the story. "I'm sorry—I was already tied up," the ex-president told newsmen, with a somewhat tongue-in-cheek air.

Asked if he meant that he couldn't go, or just didn't want to go, Truman replied laughingly: "I said I couldn't go. You can put any interpretation that you like on that that you want to—as you always do."

Truman, in Washington to make some speeches and see old friends, talked with reporters after testifying before a Senate subcommittee in favor of repealing the constitutional amendment that limits a president to two terms.

The 22nd amendment, which imposes the two-term limit, was adopted while Truman was in office and did not apply to him.

Justice Frankfurter, author of the majority opinion, spoke of the need for maintaining basic minimum standards of community health to prevent the spread of disease.

"Time and experience have forcefully taught that the power to inspect dwelling places . . . to treat a specific problem is of indispensable importance to the maintenance of health," he said.

The power to inspect private dwellings, Frankfurter said, would be greatly hobbled by a blanket requirement of the safeguards necessary for a search for evidence of criminal acts.

The case which resulted in upholding the right of a health inspector to search a private home without a warrant originated in Baltimore.

Aaron D. Frank, a Baltimore resident, was fined \$20 for refusing to admit a health inspector who had no search warrant.

The inspector asked to be admitted after a neighbor complained of rats in the area.

Missile May Hold Ape

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP) — A live animal, probably an ape, will be fired into space in the nose cone of a Jupiter missile within the next 60 days, the chief of the Army's space program said yesterday.

Maj. Gen. John B. Medaris, commander of the Army Ordnance Missile Command, revealed the coming venture at a press conference. He didn't say what type of animal would be launched but indicated that a monkey would be the best guess.

Taylor Wins 1959 Pulitzer Fiction Prize

NEW YORK (AP)—The 1959 Pulitzer Prize for fiction was awarded yesterday to "The Travels of Jaimie McPheeters," by Robert Lewis Taylor.

The drama award went to "J. B." by Archibald MacLeish. The gold medal for meritorious public service in journalism was awarded to the Utica (N.Y.) Observer-Dispatch and Utica Daily Press for their campaign against local vice, gambling and corruption.

The international reporting prize went to Joseph Martin and Philip Santora of the New York Daily News, for their account of the downfall of the Batista regime in Cuba.

The other journalism awards were:

National Reporting—Howard Van Smith of the Miami (Fla.) News, for his account of the cleanup of a Florida migrant labor camp.

Local Reporting—Miss Mary Lou Werner of the Washington (D.C.) Evening Star, for a story "at edition time"; John Harold Brislin of the Scranton (Pa.) Tribune and the Scrantonian, for a story involving no deadline.

Editorial Writing—Ralph McGill of the Atlanta (Ga.) Constitution.

Nehru Says He Is Shocked At Red Charges

NEW DELHI, India (AP)—Prime Minister Nehru said yesterday he is shocked by Red Chinese reiteration of charges—which his government has denied—of Indian meddling in Tibet.

But he said he wants to stay on good terms with Peiping. "Nothing must be said or done that endangers friendly relations," Nehru told Parliament in a 40-minute speech winding up debate on the Tibetan revolt.

He rejected suggestions that the rebellion might bring a change in India's policy of nonalignment. He took note of reports that India might join Western-minded Pakistan for a common defense.

"We do not propose to have military alignments with any country—come what may. Be clear about it," he said.

He said India will continue to observe the five principles of co-existence regardless of what other countries may do. Those principles, to which India and Red China subscribed in 1954, include noninterference in the internal affairs of other nations and self-determination for national groups.

Chinese speakers have continued to assert that the Dalai Lama, the Tibetans' 23-year-old god-king, is in India under duress and that the rebellion has been directed from Indian soil.

Cigarette Tax Increases

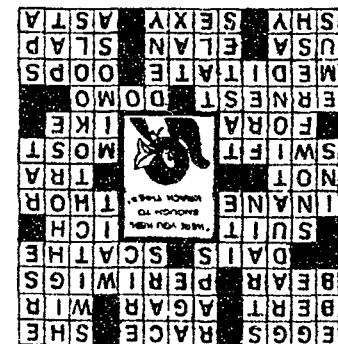

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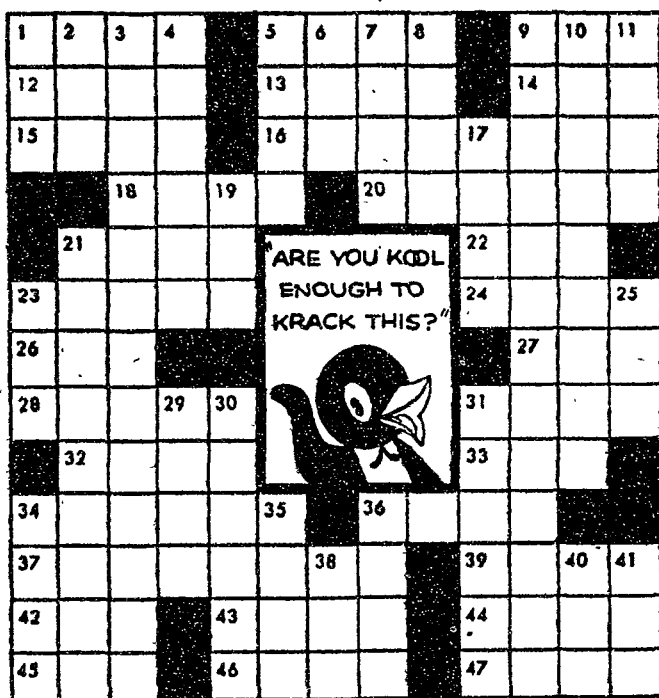
