## Science Foundation to Award 1000 Graduate Fellowships

The National Science Foundation will award approximately 1000 Cooperative Graduate Fellowships in science for the academic year 1959-60.

Applications will be available in the Graduate School office in June, and must be returned for consideration early in the Fall.

The fellowships will be awarded to any citizen of the United States who has demonstrated the ability and special aptitude required for advanced training in the sciences. All applicants will be required to take an examination to test their scientific and scholastic aptitude and achievement. Applicants will be screened first by the institution through which they have applied and again by panels of scientists chosen by the National Academy of Sciences National Research Council. Final selection will be made by the National Science Foundation.

The annual stipend for the fellowships will be \$2200 which may be supplemented by the partici-

pating institution at an annual rate of not more than \$800. A fellow may receive no other remuneration.

The fellowships will be awarded in the mathematical, physical, medical, biological, and engineering sciences, including anthropology, psychology (excluding clinical psychology) and in the social sciences where they conform to accepted standards of scientific inquiry.
