

Golfers Beat Bisons As Burgoon Stars

The Nittany Lion linksmen took their third straight win of the season as they defeated the Bucknell Bisons, 5-2, yesterday on the Lewisburg course.

"Most of the team played well although a few did not play up to par" golf coach Joe Boyle said.

Dick Burgoon played the best match of the day as he beat Bob Etzweiler of the Bisons, 3 and 1.

Burgoon was in command of the match for most of the round and finally defeated his opponent on the 17th hole.

Scott Stultz became a winner for the Lions as he defeated Ted Linholm by a 2 and 1 score. Stultz was also in charge of the contest for the whole match and had relatively little trouble in defeating his opponent. His record for the year is 6-2.

Bill Davidson, link captain and Eastern champion, won an easy victory as he took Bill Curtis, 4 and 3. Davidson, who has a 5-3 record, has been looking good lately, winning his last two matches by relatively big scores.

Roy Altman also won for the Nittanians, beating Dick Bartholomew by a 4 and 2 score. According to Boyle, this is the best win Altman has turned in this year. He has dropped some tight matches in previous encounters.

The other win for the Lions was carded by Ed Kormos as he

trounced Steve Strobeck of the Bisons, 4 and 2.

According to Boyle, "Easy Ed," as he is called by his teammates, played some very impressive golf yesterday and will be the seventh man that will be sent to the East-erns.

The only losses incurred by Penn State were those of John Morton and Haydn Thomas. Morton had his five match winning streak snapped as he lost to Joe Miller by a 1-up score. Morton did not play up to par even though he lost a tough match, the Lion mentor added.

Haydn Thomas also lost a tough one as he dropped a 20 hole, 1 up decision to Bob Schad. Thomas had trouble finding the small Bucknell greens and this consequently cost him the victory.

Boyle said that although the Bisons only have a nine hole course it is very tricky. The greens are of the postage stamp variety, he added.
