Harshbarger is the coordinator of religious affairs and professor of religion in the College of the Liberal Arts. He was recently the guest preacher at the University Chapel at Rutgers University in New Brunswick, N.J. He is currently assisting the University Chapel Choir in finalizing plans for its third European tour scheduled for this summer.

In addition to appearance, the cows will be judged on training and fitting.

Brown Swiss, Ayrshire, Guernsey, Jersey and Holstein cows from the University's herds will comprise the entries for the various fitting and showing contests.

Glen Shirk, senior in dairy science from Quarryville, is this year's show manager.

In addition to the judging, the show will feature the Dairy Queen, Lois Piercy, senior in elementary education from Springfield.

Displays of articles made in classes in dairy manufacturing will be shown under the direction of James Hickman, senior in dairy science from Bethal Park.

Tours of the University Creamery will be conducted by members of the Dairy Science Club, who annually sponsor the exposition.

This year's show will be dedi-

ated to the memory of Dr. William R. Davey, who was an assistant professor of Dairy Science until his death in June 1958.

Dr. Davey, an alumnus of the University, served as adviser of the Dairy Science Club for 10 years. He was also adviser of Alpha Gamma Rho social fraternity and a member of Gamma Sigma Delta and Sigma Xi honorary fraternities.

The play is a retelling of the old legend of the Trojan War and is written in the style of the modern French playwrights. Part comedy and part tragedy, it is told in two acts, a prologue and an epilogue.

The original one-piece set, designed by Joseph Servello, senior in art education from Altoona, is in the form of simple blocks arranged on levels to provide a distinction between the Greek gods and mortals of the time.

The author is a professor of theatre arts at the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill. This is the first time his play has been produced.
