

Speakers To Compete In Contest

Six finalists will be chosen in the elimination meetings of the annual John Henry Frizzell Extempore Speaking Contest at 7 p.m. Monday in Sparks.

The contest is sponsored by the Department of Speech in honor of Frizzell, who was University chaplain and professor and head of the Department of Speech. He retired in 1946 with the rank of emeritus.

The contest has been held for more than 75 years and is probably the oldest speaking contest in the country.

First prize is \$50 and the John Henry Frizzell award of merit. Second prize is \$25 and the award of merit.

At the elimination meeting each entrant will speak without notes for five minutes. The contestants will be grouped in sections. One person from each section will be chosen to speak in the semi-finals on the same evening. Six contestants will then be chosen for the final round.

Each finalist will deliver a speech other than the one used in the previous meetings. The finals will be held at 7 p.m. May 18, in 110 Electrical Engineering.

Last year's winners were: First place, Vicki O'Donnell, senior in arts and letters from Irwin, and second place, Mary Ann Gemmill, senior in education from New Cumberland.

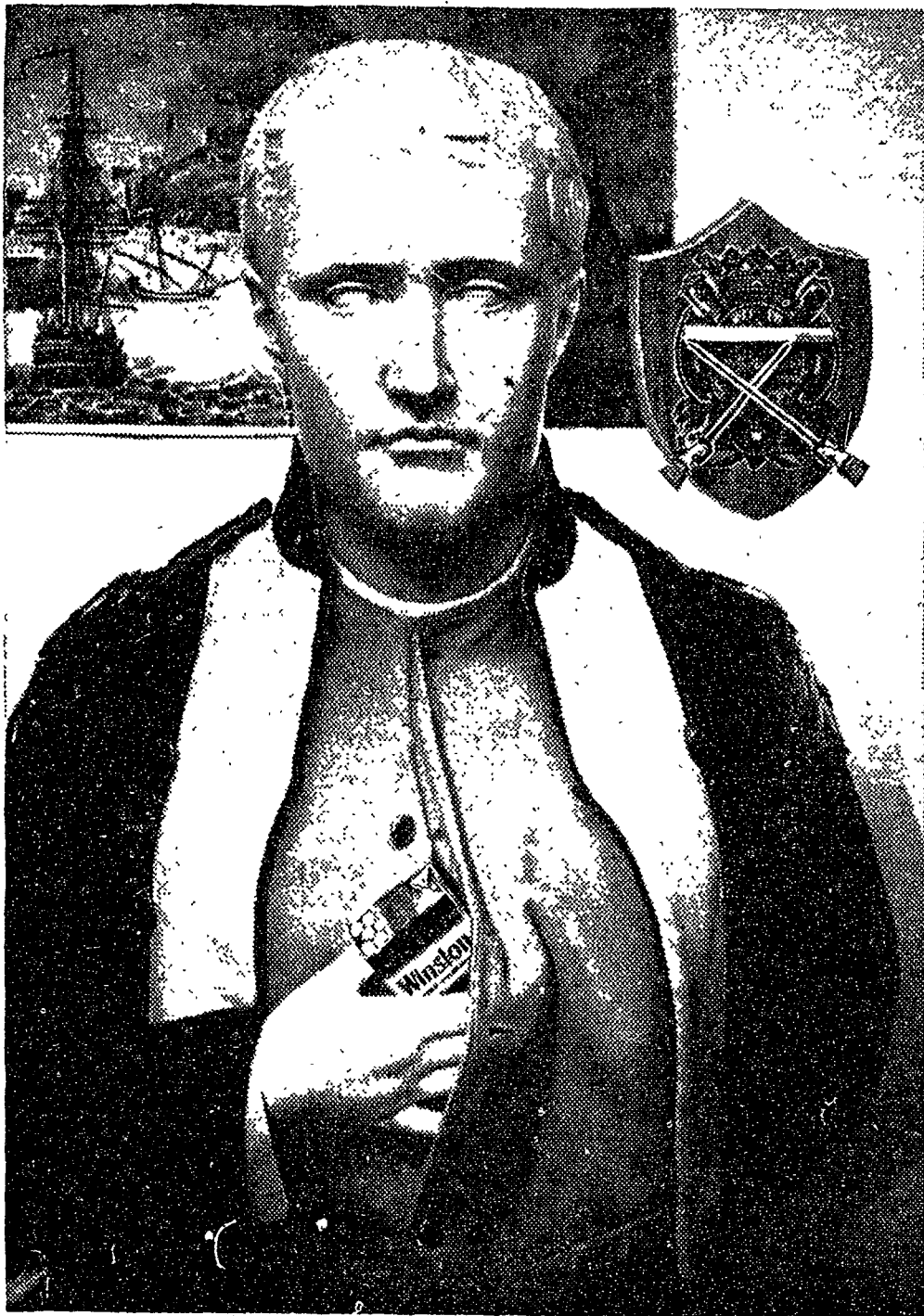
