

'Nine' Plays Lehigh at Home

Two weeks ago it looked like Ron Riese was headed for a disastrous season. The Lions' leading pitcher of 1958 hadn't won or finished a game.

But Riese got healthy in a hurry, winning three straight games to regain his spot in Penn State's starting rotation. And today that's where he'll be when the Lions play Lehigh at 3.30 p.m. on Beaver Field.

Riese takes a 3-0 record into today's game and if recent performances are any indication, he is going to be tough.

The little righthander won two games last week, beating Navy and Colgate in relief. His other

win came against Georgetown on a 9-0 shutout.

While Riese will be looking for his fourth win, the Lions will go after their 12th win of the campaign, against two losses.

The Nittanians had an eight game winning streak broken Saturday when they lost to Syracuse, 10-6, but they came back to win the nightcap, 9-1, to start a new streak which they hope to extend today.

Lehigh comes into today's game with a 5-10 record—but it is deceiving. For the Engineers have lost some close ball games to some of the best teams in the East, including Rutgers and Lafayette. Just last weekend they

dropped two games to the Leopards.

Two of Lehigh's wins have been over Penn and Gettysburg, two teams that the Nittanians also beat. The Engineers beat Penn, 5-2, while the Lions beat them, 10-3, and Lehigh beat Gettysburg, 13-6. The Lions beat the Bullets, 10-6.

Craig Anderson, who has won all of Lehigh's games this year, will probably get the starting nod for Lehigh this afternoon.

Jack Serfass, the Lehigh shortstop and Ron Vaughn, the Engineers' rightfielder carry most of Lehigh's hitting attack. Serfass was hitting just below .400 before last week's games with

Lafayette while Vaughn was hitting .313.

Lion coach Joe Bedenk will go along with his usual starting lineup for today's game.

Bill Benton will be at first, Larry Fegley on second, Bob Hoover at shortstop and Dick Landis on third. Tom Durbin will start in leftfield, with Doug Caldwell in center and Zeke DeLong in right. Either John Adams or Harry Beans will catch for the Lions.

Nittany Netters Shutout By Strong Quakers, 9-0

Penn State's tennis team received its first shutout loss of the season when Pennsylvania's strong netters beat the Lions yesterday in Philadelphia, 9-0, for the 17th straight time.

The Quakers were hardly hospitable to the visiting Lions sweeping every match in straight sets.

Dick Ludwig made the most impressive showing for Coach Sherm Fogg's racketmen. The sophomore netter dropped a 6-4, 6-4, contest to the Quaker's first man, John Mangan.

Mangan is a highly respected veteran whom Fogg tabbed as one of the very best in Eastern tennis circles. He secured a leave of absence to play tennis all year in California two years ago. He then returned to handle the number one position on Coach Wallace Johnson's Penn team.

Second man Jerry Carp also lost by a close margin. He dropped his match to Howard Friedel, 7-5, 6-4.

Captain Chuck Bibleheimer, who contributed heavily to the Lions' victory over Syracuse last Saturday, didn't fare as well yesterday. He lost to third man Ken Lehman, 6-1, 6-4.

Gary Moore, playing in the fourth position, lost to Bert Berkwich, 6-0, 6-3, and senior Don Harnett was beaten by Rus Cleveland, 6-1, 6-3. John Blanck, handling the sixth position chores, was edged by Dorem Knauer, 9-7 6-4.

The doubles activity was much the same story, as the Nittanians could only cop a total of 11 games in the six sets.

Ludwig and Moore lost to Mangan and Cleveland, 6-2, 6-2. Carp and Bibleheimer were defeated by Friedel and Van Amerongen, 6-1 6-1, and Don McCartney and Blanck were upended by Knauer and Lehman, 6-4, 6-1.

The Foggmen don't play again until Tuesday when they travel to Morgantown to face the Mountaineers of West Virginia.

Moran, 2-Mile Team To Run in Coliseum

Star miler Ed Moran and the Nittany 2-mile relay team travel to Los Angeles, California this weekend while the rest of the Lion track squad will stop off at Pittsburgh to engage the Panthers in a dual meet to uphold "traditional rivalry."

Moran, Chick King, Dick Engelbrink, Don Davies and Bill Schwab have been invited to sunny southern California to compete in the Coliseum Relays, one of the top invitational track meets in the country.

The Coliseum Relays is the biggest track carnival on the West Coast drawing together the top spikemen from the talent-laden Pacific area plus name stars from throughout the country. The races are run on a grass track in the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum, current home of the baseball Dodgers.

Moran will run in the featured mile which is filled with an outstanding array of entrants that includes Hungarian Lazo Tabori, Greek Evangelos Depastas and Air Force lieutenant Bill Dellinger, all familiar names in the track world.

The Lion 2-mile team of Davies, Schwab, King and Engelbrink will run against top-notch baton squads from Occidental, UCLA, Southern Cal and Stanford.

Stanford's quartet of Dick Lassen, Don Chesarek, Beatil Lundh, and Ernie Cunliffe has recorded the lowest time this year—7:25.4. The four Indians clocked this time at the Fresno Relays and clipped 4.5 seconds off the old Fresno Relays record set by Occidental's Ty Hadley and Company in 1958.

Wayne Lemois, Ted Smith,

Tom Anderson and Bob Shankland, the Southern Cal team, set a new school record a couple weeks ago, clocking a 7:27. UCLA's best time is 7:37.1 and Oxy's fastest is 7:38.7.

The Penn State 2-mile crew, which has seldom been composed of the same members in successive races, ran 7:38 at the Quantico Relays, but its fastest time was the 7:35.5 clocking it clipped off indoors at the New York Knights of Columbus meet. This foursome included Moran, Davies, King, and Engelbrink.

Bill Schwab, who will be replacing Moran, ran the best half mile of his life Saturday against Michigan State when he crossed the finish in 1:50.7.
