

# ROTC Drill Teams To March Tonight

Army, Navy and Air Force ROTC units and drill teams will march in the Armed Forces Day parade at 7 tonight.

The State College High School Band will lead the parade followed by the Headquarters and Service Company of the 491st Engineer Battalion, a State College Reserve Unit; a first aid truck of the Ordnance Research Laboratory; Scabbard and Blade, military honorary, and Scabbard and Blade Queen, June Gurke.

The band and three companies of the Army ROTC will be followed by the Pershing Rifles and the Navy band and companies will be followed by the Navy drill team.

The Air Force ROTC will include the band, the Falcon Drill Team, Angel Flight, the Eagle Drill Team and the Air Force Drum and Bugle Corps.

The parade will start at Shortlidge Road and E. College Ave. It will move west on College Ave. to Burrowes Road and then north to Pollock Road.

Ray V. Watkins, of State College, will serve as grand marshal of the parade. The members of his staff are Col. Arthur W. Kogstad, professor of military science and tactics; Capt. John P. Roach, professor of naval science; Orin H. Rigley, professor of air science; and Josephine Groesbeck, representing the women in the service.

The new plan also includes a general lowering of the fees charged for cashing checks, Katzen said.

The rates in the new bill are 10 cents for checks up to \$10, 20 cents for checks from \$10.01 to \$25, 30 cents for checks from \$25.01 to \$50 and 40 cents for checks from \$50.01 to \$125.

SCCA hours would be from 12:30 to 5:30 p.m. Monday through Friday, 1 to 5 p.m. Saturday, and from 1 to 4 p.m. on Sunday, Katzen said.

All checks up to \$25 would be cashed seven days a week. No personal checks over \$25 will be cashed and non-personal checks over \$25 will be cashed only Monday through Friday.

## Chapel Choir Will Present Brahms' 'German Requiem'

"A German Requiem" by Brahms has been selected for the twelfth annual Spring Concert of the University Chapel Choir and the University Symphony Orchestra to be held at 8:30 tonight in Schwab Auditorium.

Soloists appearing with the choir will be Mary Jane West, senior in music education, and Raymond Brown, assistant professor of music.

Miss West, a soprano, has sung with the Chapel Choir for eight semesters under the direction of Willa Taylor. Brown has sung previously with the choir as the baritone soloist in 1954, 1955 and 1956.

Fifty-two members of the University Symphony, under the di-

rection of Conductor Theodore K. Karhan, will accompany the choir.

The concert choir consists of 113 singers. Nine alumni members, Joan Nesbitt, Suzanne Hess, James Hess, James Beach, Rex Norton, Chester Mais, Robert Sprague, Lewis Roscoe and Donald Fought, are returning to sing in this Spring Concert. Four members of the State College Choral Society, Mona Lezak, Norma Condee, Lydia Finch and Barbara Kaufman, will also sing.

The Brahms' work was first presented at the University in 1949, was repeated at the 1952 concert and is presented this year on the ninetieth anniversary of its 1869 second premier in Bremen, Germany.
