

# Braun to Give Chapel Sermon

Braun is the chaplain to the University of the United Church of Christ. Samuel N. Gibson, executive director of the University Christian Association, will lead in worship.

# Guest Prof To Speak At Chapel

Joseph Sittler, professor of theology in the Federated Theological Faculty of the University of Chicago, will speak on the theme "Toward Christian Humanism" at the University Chapel service of worship at 10:55 a.m. tomorrow in Schwab Auditorium.

The Chapel Choir, directed by Will Taylor, will sing the Pentecost festival hymn "Creator Spirit, by Whose Aid" by Tallis. The anthem will be "O Come, Let Us Sing Unto the Lord" by Berger.

University organist, George E. Ceiga, will play "Nun Bitten Wir Den Heiligen Geist" by Walther as the prelude; "Nun Bitten Wir Den Heiligen Geist" by Buxtehude as the offertory; and "Eighth Trio in G Major" by Bach as the postlude.

Sittler received his bachelor of arts degree from Wittenberg College and his bachelor of divinity from Hamma Divinity School. He holds the doctor of divinity degree from Wagner College and the doctor of laws degree from Wittenberg College. He has done graduate study at Oberlin, Western Reserve, the University of Chicago and the University of Heidelberg in Germany.

Sittler is the author of two books "The Doctrine of the Word" and "The Structure of Christian Ethics."

# Nutter to Be Chairman of Career Day

Wade Nutter, junior in forestry from Wexford, has been appointed chairman of the 1960 All-University Career Day.

The Inter-College Council Board, which sponsored Career Day in April, will sponsor it again next year. Jack Kendall, present chairman, said at an IC-CB meeting Thursday that a budget of \$1500 had been set for Career Day, but that he doubted if the full amount would be allotted.

The exposition cost \$850 this year, he said. Placement Service donated \$150 and the Alumni Association \$500. ICCB agreed to return \$50 of the Alumni Association's donation.

Student council presidents reported favorable reactions from their council members on the proposed grade point system. Faculty response was lukewarm, some of the presidents reported.

The proposed system would allow for grades to descend in degrees of .1, rather than in whole numbers as they do now.

ICCB also planned a reception for new faculty members on September 15. A tour of the campus will precede the reception.

# Borough Puts Meters In 2 Parking Lots

State College opened two metered parking lots yesterday, one on W. Beaver Ave. just off S. Allen St. and one on S. Frazier St. next to the Centre Daily Times' building.

It is now mandatory to pay for parking time on meters until 10 p.m.—both in the lots and on the streets. The old limit was 6 p.m.

The meters on the lots have a time maximum of 12 hours and can be paid with any combination of nickles, dimes and quarters on the basis of a nickle for one half hour of parking time.

No policy has as yet been adopted by the State College Parking Authority concerning all-night parking.
