

Industry Offers Summer Jobs

The choice may not be as great as it was a few months ago, but there is still a good chance students can get interesting and well-paid jobs in industry this summer. Juniors, seniors and graduate students are most often requested, but there are also positions for freshmen, sophomores and even for members of the faculty listed in the University's Placement Service files. Students from New York State may be able to find work near their home.

Two department stores are offering training programs this summer. Woodward and Lathrop in Washington, D.C., has a summer training program for juniors in home economics, business administration, and liberal arts. Abraham and Strauss needs juniors from the New York area for a summer executive training program. Those participating will receive \$70 per week.

Those who wish to work with the U.S. government may find a position with the Forest Service or the Department of Interior. The former requests freshmen, sophomores and juniors in civil engineering or mechanical engineering. The National Park Service, under the Department of Interior, needs civil engineering students as assistant engineers.

Students who have completed their junior year in civil engineering may apply for positions as senior construction inspectors with Pennsylvania's Department of Highways. Wages offered are \$1.89 an hour.

Laboratory positions can be found at Cornell Aeronautical Laboratory, Diamond Ordnance Fuse Laboratory where research is done for the Ordnance Corps of the Army, Riegel Paper Corp., and H. J. Heinz Co. where those accepted for employment will do laboratory analyses of tomato products.

Home Life Insurance has po-

sitions available for upperclassmen in mathematics or engineering who are interested in actuarial work. Positions for both faculty and students may be found at the Boeing Airplane Co., in either Wichita, Kansas or Seattle, Washington.

Students may obtain more information about summer employment by looking through the open files at the Placement Service in 112 Old Main. Applications may be sent directly to addresses listed in the files.

(Continued from page five) McKeesport got one the following year.

For five years various types of centers were opened and closed throughout the state. In 1950 the Ogontz Center in Abington opened.

But, the year 1953 saw an important step in the formation of the Commonwealth Campuses. Two-year associate degree programs were started in Allentown, Altoona, Erie, Hazleton, McKeesport, Ogontz, Pottsville, Scranton, Wilkes-Barre and York.

That year all the one-year Day Technical Institutes were discontinued.

And at the January 1959 meeting the Board of Trustees approved the new System of Commonwealth Campuses, which will go into effect this September.

Transfers Will Visit Fraternities

Approximately 1100 transfer students will participate in open houses sponsored by eight fraternities during Orientation Week next fall.

The open houses, sponsored jointly by the Interfraternity Council and the Panhellenic Council, will serve to acquaint transfer men and women with fraternities and give them a chance to meet each other.

Between 8 and 9:45 p.m. Sept. 17, the transfer students will go with their orientation counselors to one of the 18 fraternities.

Richard McMahon, IFC open house chairman, said the fraternities were selected on the basis of previous participation in the program, location and curriculum representation.

Groups of about 50 men and women will go to each house along with five Panhel hostesses. Refreshments, dancing and a skit will be included in the program. There will be no rushing.
