

Students to Pay Class Gift Fee

All full-time students will be asked to contribute to a fund for a gift to the University from their graduating class. Donations for the gift will be taken at a booth set up during registration at Recreation Hall.

Students to Pay Fee To Park

A series of new regulations will be applied to student parking on campus this year.

Students were notified by mail this summer that in order to help pay for the expansion of campus parking facilities, a fee of \$15 per semester will be charged each student who is permitted to park on campus during the day.

In addition to the \$15 per semester charge the following regulations have been set up:

• Students who do not wish to pay the fee are still required to register their cars, but they will

Students without parking permits may park on campus in certain areas until they have finished registration. The areas designated for such parking are: (area 83) across from the flower gardens near Park Ave.; (area 43) at the eastern end of the Nittany area; (area 50) north of the former Jordan Fertility Plots; and (area 52) north of the new tennis course along Entrance Road.

Simes said these were the only areas for cars without permits and could only be used until the student had completed registration.

not be permitted to park anywhere on campus from 7 a.m. until 5:30 p.m. Monday through Friday and from 7 a.m. until noon on Saturday.

• Students who do not pay the fee will be restricted to certain areas after 5:30 p.m. on weekdays; after Saturday noon, and all day Sunday.

• Students who do purchase daytime parking permits will be entitled to 24-hour parking in the lot assigned.

• Permits will be issued first to students with disabilities and to those who live outside the walking area as defined in the traffic regulations. Copies of the regulations are available at the Campus Patrol office in Spruce Cottage.

Dean of Men Frank J. Simes said permits would be offered to students living inside the walking zone if space permitted.

The parking fee will be due at registration when the permits will be issued. Cars without permits may be parked at the specified times in (area 23) the Hetzel Union parking lot; (area 11) south of Recreation Hall in the areas behind the campus fraternities; (area 70 and 70A) along the east side of Beaver Field and (area 46) behind South Halls.

Greek Week Helps Town And Campus

Public relations is the main goal of Greek Week, sponsored each spring by the Interfraternity Council and the Panhellenic Council.

Begun in 1952, Greek Week is a week of activities designed to acquaint Greeks with each other and with townspeople.

Climaxing the week is the IFC-Panhel Ball, kickoff for the first "big weekend" of the spring semester.

On the serious side of Greek Week are the work projects by fraternities and sororities. These are done in and around State College.

The first event of the week is Greek Sunday in which fraternities and sororities sponsor services in Schwab Auditorium and in local churches and synagogues.

The IFC-Panhel Sing usually attracts a large audience. Competition is keen among fraternities and sororities in this event.

Exchange dinners enable fraternity men to visit sorority women in the dining halls for dinner and sorority women to visit fraternities for dinner. Last year fraternity men were able to visit sorority suites after dinner.

Faculty to Invite Student Groups To Visit Homes

The first activities of orientation week will begin at 6:45 tonight with a program of student-faculty meetings designed to acquaint the freshmen with religious activities at the University.

A total of 70 faculty members will be at five meeting places where they will receive Protestant and Orthodox students and conduct them in small groups to their homes.

Students in McElwain, Simmons, Hibbs, Haller, Cross, Cooper, Stephens and Nittany Halls 39 to 44 will meet their hosts at the HUB Main Lounge.

Students from Grange, Hoyt, Ewing, McAllister and Nittany Halls 21 to 38 will meet their hosts at the Methodist Student Center, 256 E. College Ave.

Students in McKee and Hamilton Halls will meet their hosts at the Lutheran Student Center, 412 W. College Ave.

Students from Jordan, Watts, Beam and the third and fourth floors and levels A and B of Thompson Hall will meet their hosts at the Waring Hall Lounge.

Students from Holmes, Leete, Runkle, Irvin, Lyons and the first and second floors of Thompson Hall will meet their hosts at the Helen Eakin Eisenhower Memorial lounge.

Commuting students will meet their hosts in Waring Hall.

This program will take the place of University-appropriated money which covered the cost of each Senior Class Gift from 1948 until last year.

Before 1948 funds for the class gift came from a damage deposit assessed all students. When all student fees were consolidated into one general fee in that year, the deposit ceased to exist. From then until last year the University paid for the Senior Class Gift.

Last year University officials announced that money could no longer be allocated for the gift. Rather than let the tradition lapse, the new plan was adopted.

The new plan calls for a gradual shift of responsibility for the cost of each gift from the University to the students themselves. Over a 4-year period each student, beginning with members of the present sophomore class, will donate a total of \$4 to the fund.

Under the plan, this year's senior class will receive \$2 from the University for every \$2 it raises. The present junior class will collect \$3 for every dollar donated by the University, and the present sophomore and freshman classes will collect the full \$4. The money will be due and payable in specified sums at each fall registration.

This year, each freshman and sophomore will donate \$1 at fall registration, and each senior will donate \$2. Juniors will be able to donate either \$1 or \$2 at this time and the difference next fall.

Members of the three upperclass advisory boards will staff the collection booth in Rec Hall. The money will then be held by the Alumni Association until each senior class decides on its gift. Plans now call for members of each class to vote for their gift choice in their eighth semester.

Once the gift has been determined, the senior class president will present a check for its purchase to President Eric A. Walker.

The committee which set up the collection-at-registration program is composed of class officers. The booth will be located at the end of the registration process.

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
