

Assembly to Hear Encampment Results

The 8th annual Student Encampment ended Friday on a highly successful note with approval of six workshop reports which will be submitted to the Student Government Association Assembly in the near future.

The 3-day meeting of approximately 120 faculty, administration, and student leaders was held at the University's Mont Alto Forestry School. A series of Daily Collegian articles beginning next week will explain the recommendations coming out of each workshop.

These recommendations will go before the Assembly for action, delegation to committees or administration, or revisions.

Student members of the Encampment were chosen through their positions in student activities and interviews. Faculty and

administration members attended through invitation.

William Jaffe, senior in journalism from Philipsburg, was chairman of the meeting whose purpose was to provide an informal atmosphere for discussing University problems.

The idea of this informal meeting was originated by Milton S. Eisenhower, former president of the University, who had started a similar project at Kansas State College.

Encampment members, divided into several workshops, attended meetings to discuss problems pertinent to the title of their workshop. The scope of problems extended to student government, school spirit, judicial systems, expansion, academic affairs and off and on campus living.

Workshops and their chairmen were: Off-Campus Living Problems, Robert Parsky and Harald Sandstrom; Academic Affairs and Curricular Revision, Carol Frank; University Expansion, Jay Hawley; Responsibilities of SGA, Jessie Janjigian; School Spirit, Lannéy Day, and Student Conduct, Carl Smith.

CHICAGO (AP) — Ken Boyer used his 28th homer and a stand-up triple to extend his consecutive hitting streak to 29 games yesterday as the St. Louis Cardinals rode rookie Bib Gibson's six-hit pitching to a 6-4 conquest of the Chicago Cubs.

Boyer waited no longer than his first turn at bat to drive losing lefty Art Ceccarelli's third pitch into left field seats behind a two out walk to Joe Cunningham. This gave St. Louis a 2-0 lead and squared the series at a game apiece.
