## UBA to Accept Used Books Until Tuesday

Approximately 925 books were collected by the Used Book Agency yesterday morning in the first day of operation this semester.

The UBA will continue to accept books until Tuesday. Books will go on sale 9 a.m. Friday. The UBA will remain in operation during the first week of classes.

Students are asked to set their prices at no more than 80% of the book's cost. Ten cents is added to the student's asking-price by the agency to cover handling costs.

Lists of all books no longer being used will be posted outside the cardroom along with the books required for courses. Money will be refunded Sept. 25 for incorrect books.

Lines waiting to get into the cardroom may almost run into the lines of freshmen waiting to buy their dinks and namecards from the Book Exchange. All freshmen must have their dinks by Friday night in order to be admitted to Dink Debut.

About 2700 dinks have been sold so far. This is about 70% of the new freshman class.

That "Penn State is not a country club" was stressed by Walker. In order to gain the maturity and judgment expected from a college education, one must dig in and work hard seven days a week, he said. He stated that this is the only way to become literate in your profession, in your fellow man, in yourself and in God.
